## *A letter from the Superintendent*

Dear Friends,

Basketball great Michael Jordan was once featured in a commercial that carried a very inspirational and powerful message that resonates with our District today. Jordan stated, "I missed more than 9,000 shots in my career. I've lost almost 300 games. Twenty-six times I've been trusted to take the game winning shot and missed. I've failed over and over and over again in my life and that is why I succeed."

Michael Jordan was not only a gifted athlete, he was also very wise. We, as a District, share the paradigm we must not be afraid. We must have the courage to try. This not only applies to our students in the classrooms, on the fields, or on the stage, it also applies to our staff members who are working to prepare our students for jobs in the future that are vastly different than the occupations of today.

As of September 28, 2012, our District PreK-12 enrollment was 4,309. The enrollment by building as compared to the same time last year is as follows:

We are excited about the growth patterns we are experiencing in the Camdenton R-III School District; however, we recognize growth within our District presents new challenges. Please find below some of the challenges we are facing during the 2012-2013 school year.

- ◆ Due to our increasing student enrollment we are facing capacity issues in a number of our buildings. Our most pressing need is at Osage Beach Elementary. We currently occupy every classroom in the building plus we had to remodel the vestibule area to create additional classroom space.
- ◆ Dogwood Elementary's capacity according to our District's facility plan is 848. Our current enrollment is 842. While we do have some room to expand, we must remember a large student population is not best practice for early elementary education.
- ◆ At Hurricane Deck Elementary the District's facility master plan identified traffic entering and leaving Highway 5 as a safety concern. Due to the widening of the highway the southern entrance to the property will be closed, adding to the safety concern for this building.
- ◆ During recent meetings with our community's Patron Panel our parents/community noted the need for parity in our District's facilities. Our community desires the same facilities and opportunities in all of our District's buildings. We must not be afraid of taking a "shot" to meet these needs.

This spring the Camdenton R-III Board of Education approved a resolution to support the Missouri Vision Project. This project is a joint effort between the Missouri School Boards' Association and the Missouri Association of School Administrators. This plan has three major goals: create unifying principles to change the education culture in the state, provide schools with guidance as they work to provide increased opportunities in communities, and build trust and support for public education.

As we work to meet the goals of this plan there will be challenges. Like Michael Jordan we must have the courage to rise to our challenges. We must press on to succeed in reaching our vision of *"Everyone Learning Every Day."*

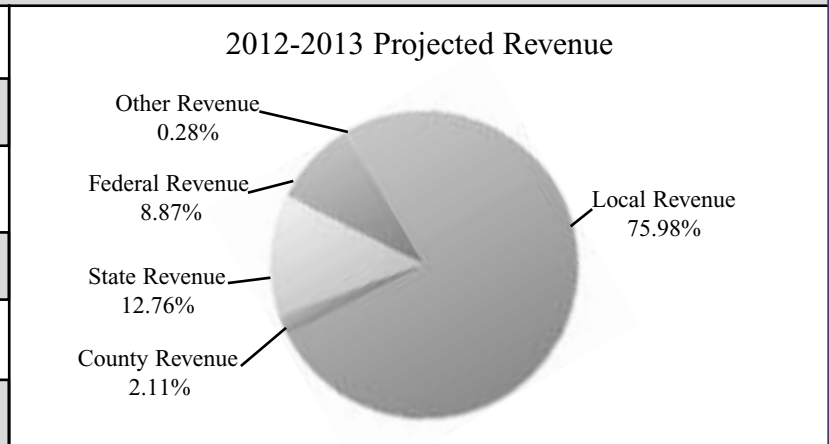

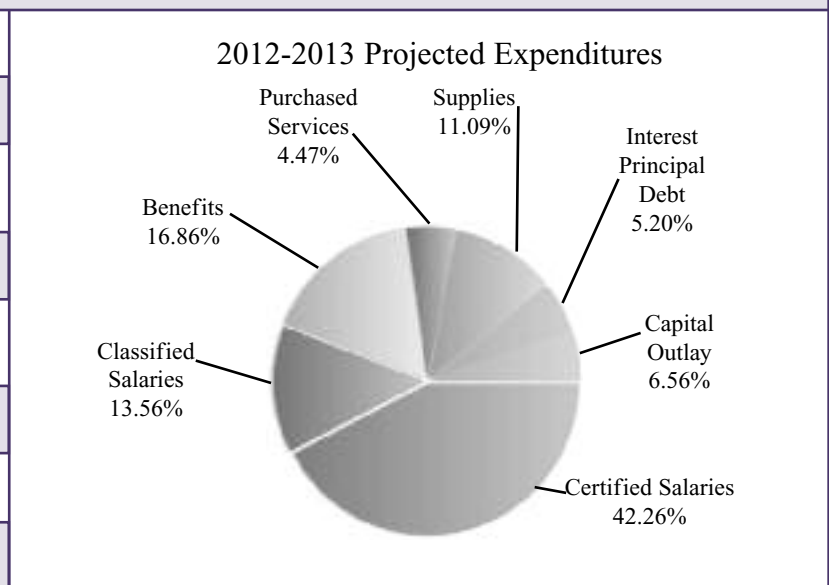

### Maximum Levy Authorized for Operations \$2.75

- In November 1998, Missouri voters approved an amendment to the Constitution authorizing Boards of Education to levy up to \$2.75 per \$100 assessed valuation without a vote of the people.

### Actual Tax Levied for Operations \$2.67

- This is the part of the school tax levy dedicated to operations (Incidental Fund \$1.33 + Teachers Fund \$1.18 + Capital Projects Fund \$0.16 = \$2.67).

### Tax Required for Debt Retirement \$.20

- This is the part of the school tax levy set by the Camdenton R-III Board of Education for debt retirement.

# CHS ACT Scores Remain Above the State Average

The Camdenton R-III School District is pleased to announce that the average ACT scores for the graduates of 2011-12 remain above the state average composite scores. The ACT consists of curriculum-based tests of educational development in English, Mathematics, Reading, and Science. These tests are designed to measure the skills needed for success during the first year of college coursework.

# Meeting the Challenge!



Oak Ridge Intermediate, and Hawthorn, Dogwood, Hurricane Deck, and Osage Beach Elementary Schools made national news by working to support and improve the health of our children and our community. As part of their effort, healthy items are featured on their menus and

physical education and activity are emphasized. Their efforts are part of the HealthierUS School Challenge.

The HealthierUS School Challenge (HUSSC) is a voluntary national certification initiative for schools participating in the National School Lunch Program. It supports First Lady Michelle Obama's Let's Move campaign by recognizing schools that are creating healthier school environments through their promotion of good nutrition and physical activity. Sponsored by the USDA Food and Nutrition Service (FNS), the initiative encourages all schools to take a leadership role in helping students make healthier eating and physical activity choices that will last a lifetime. Schools that champion the HUSSC work hard to make changes to their school nutrition environment in order to (1) improve the quality of the foods served, (2) provide students with nutrition education, and (3) provide students with physical education and opportunities for physical activity.



A HUSSC award has four levels of superior performance: Bronze, Silver, Gold, and Gold Award of Distinction. Schools awarded receive a monetary incentive, an award plaque signed by a USDA official, a banner to display in their school, and their name listed on the Team Nutrition website.

To qualify for an award, a school must submit a formal application and meet basic criteria set forth by the FNS. The HUSSC criteria reflect the recommendations of the 2005 Dietary Guidelines for Americans, and the Institute of Medicine recommendations for foods that should be served in schools. HealthierUS Schools must also have a local school wellness policy, as mandated by Congress. Schools receiving a HUSSC award commit to meeting the criteria throughout their four-year certification period.



Special recognition is due to the school food service staff of Oak Ridge, Hawthorn, Dogwood, Osage Beach, and Hurricane Deck for their efforts in achieving school lunch menu changes leading to a HUSSC Silver award.



## Community Comes Together to Support Buddy Pack Program

***“The Lake Regional family has a big heart,”*** said Michael E. Henze, CEO of Lake Regional Health System. ***“When we learned that area schools were struggling to fund this important program, our team wanted to help.”*** Because funding was in peril due to the tough economy, area businesses and individuals have been generous in their support of the Buddy Pack program.

Lake Regional Health System is one of many contributors who understood the benefits of nutrition and health the Buddy

Pack program provides. Through departmental giving, physician pledges, one-time gifts, payroll deduction, and a generous donation from LRHS, a total of \$45,000 was raised and divided among area schools, which included Camdenton.

Coordinated through the VIPS program, volunteers work each week filling 520 Buddy Packs full of nutritious and child-friendly foods to be sent home with students who may need supplemental food on the weekend in the Camdenton Dogwood, Hawthorn, Osage Beach, and Hurricane Deck Elementary Schools, Camdenton Oak Ridge Intermediate School, Macks Creek Schools, and Climax Springs Schools.

## *“Steering the Course for the Future”*

I want to sincerely thank everyone for their generosity and support of the Foundation for the 2011-2012 school year.

Thirty-nine teachers and staff enrolled in the payroll deduction process we launched last year as a donation to the Education Foundation. The Foundation matched their donations and awarded four extremely worthy grants with a total of \$4,086 for critical education programs that fall outside the normal operating budget. We recognized the following teachers and their projects, which are targeted to impact over 450 students, at the August 15 Staff Welcome Back breakfast:

- **Geana Holland** and **Jenelle Henry** - Smartboard and Speaker Anchor for Title 1 Reading Room impacting 50 Hawthorn third and fourth grade students annually
- **Erin Kaminski** - Elmo Document Camera to develop writing and 3D math manipulatives through on-screen projection for 45 Osage Beach Elementary (OBE) fourth grade students
- **Carrie Viebrock** - Two mettalaphones to provide hands-on learning instruments for OBE and Hurricane Deck



These instruments will impact over 330 kindergarten through fourth grade students, expanding the Orff band experience not only at school concerts but as they perform at community nursing homes and rehab centers.



- **Jamie Webster** Portable monitor projector to be shared by three intervention teachers, impacting over 20 Camdenton Middle School seventh and eighth grade students requiring more rigorous educational instruction

We are continuing the payroll deduction program this year with the intent to award more classroom grants in Spring 2013, and we thank the staff who have enrolled so far.

Last February, the Foundation's Board approved the new Educator Scholarship program aimed at supporting teachers' personal development and aspirations and designed expressly for worthy Camdenton R-III certified teachers wishing to achieve advanced degrees in education. **Nikki Hubbard**, first recipient of the Educator Scholarship, was also recognized at the Staff Welcome Back breakfast. Mrs. Hubbard, Language Arts teacher at CHS since 2004, is obtaining her Masters of Education/Instructional Design through Western Governors University, and is already revamping curriculum based on her first course of studies.

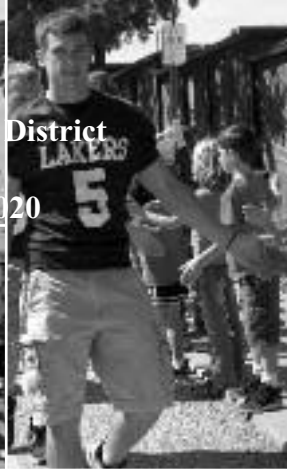

## PATRON PANEL ADDRESSES OVERCROWDING AND FACILITY NEEDS

On October 2, 2012, the District held its first Patron Panel meeting of the 2012-2013 academic year. The Patron Panel is a committee of approximately 30 citizens that includes current parents, parents of alumni, and non-parents from all parts of the school district. The group has continued its work from last year to help the District meet its challenges that include helping the District identify potential solutions to difficult issues. Some of these issues include overcrowding and facility needs that take into account the needs of students, parents, and staff.



At each meeting the group's input is documented, then presented back to them in the form of a survey.

The results of the intra-panel survey are used to narrow the focus. Allowing for an open discussion and then following it with a survey gives members the chance to truly brainstorm when they are together, then share more specific thoughts individually once they have had a chance to reflect on the group discussion. *"The insight and expertise of this group is extremely valuable as it provides an advisory role to the Board of Education and the Superintendent,"* stated

Tim Hadfield, Superintendent of Schools.

The Patron Panel is scheduled to meet quarterly and the District would like to thank the members of the group for their hard work and dedication.

## *A Letter from the Superintendent*



Dear Friends,

On January 22nd, 2013, the Camdenton R-III School Board voted to place an issue on the April ballot. This decision was made due to input received through community meetings where patrons expressed their desire to have similar facilities and opportunities for our children at Hurricane Deck and Osage Beach as our children do at the Camdenton campus. We are also facing enrollment capacity issues at Osage Beach Elementary and Dogwood Elementary.

The district is asking our patrons to consider a “No Tax Increase” bond issue to build a new Osage Beach Elementary School and refurbish and expand Hurricane Deck Elementary School. This issue would also provide funds to redesign entrances at our elementary, intermediate, and middle school buildings on the main campus. These upgrades would help improve the safety and security of these buildings.

Currently, our district has one of the lowest tax rates in the State of Missouri. The tax rate for the Camdenton R-III patrons would not change due to the passage of the ballot issue.

Election Day is April 2 and will quickly be upon us. The bond issue proposal requires a four-sevenths majority vote (57.143%) to be approved. If approved, construction would begin in September of 2013 and the project completion date is planned for July 2015.

Walter Cronkite was quoted as saying, “Whatever the cost of our libraries, the price is cheap compared to that of an ignorant nation.” Mr. Cronkite’s quote exemplifies the investment we must make as a nation to our educational institutions in order to meet the challenges of our future. In this newsletter you will find additional information regarding this “No Tax Increase” issue.

Also inside this issue, you will read about the greatest resources we have as a school district, our students and staff. The district has experienced many positives thus far this school year. On the pages that follow you can find information regarding our Pride of the Lake Marching Band’s trip to Orlando, our award-winning staff members and students, and our 11th Annual Elegant Evening facilitated by the Camdenton R-III Education Foundation.

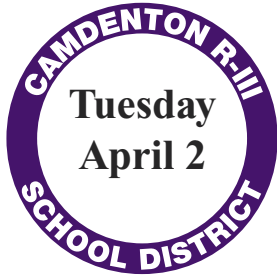

Shall Camdenton Reorganized School District No. R-3 of Camden County, Missouri, issue its general obligation bonds in the amount of \$43,000,000 for the purpose of constructing a new elementary school at Osage Beach, repairing, renovating, and building additions to Hurricane Deck Elementary School and furnishing and equipping said facilities; upgrading safety at existing school facilities; and acquiring buildings, improvements, furnishings and equipment now leased to the District by paying off and retiring outstanding leasehold financing obligations?

The authorization of the Bonds will authorize a debt service tax levy in addition to the other taxes provided for by law on all taxable tangible property in the District sufficient to pay the interest and principal of the Bonds as they fall due. The District's debt service tax levy is estimated to increase approximately 11 cents, from \$0.20 to \$0.31 per one hundred dollars of assessed valuation.

## Lake Transition Fair

On Friday, January 25, the Lake Transition Network (LTN) and State Fair Community College hosted their third annual Transition Fair at the State Fair campus in Osage Beach. Lake Transition Network began when they received a grant in 2009 from the Missouri Department of Elementary and Secondary Education (DESE) to form a community transition team that promotes collaboration between agencies, parents, self-advocates, businesses and schools to improve postgraduate outcomes for students with disabilities.

Five school districts participated in the Lake Transition Network Transition Fair this year. Camdenton, School of the Osage, Eldon, St. Elizabeth, and Tuscumbia brought students and many parents to the event. The purpose of the fair was to make students and their parents aware of resources available for students with disabilities. Presentations from Vocational Rehabilitation, AO Employment Services, State Fair Community College, Missouri Career Center and the Senate Bill 40 Board agencies from Miller, Morgan, and Camden County focused on transition services available and how to access this information. In addition, there were about twenty booth participants including various community colleges, technical centers, and developmental disability agencies. You can find a list of all participants and pictures on the Lake Transition Network Facebook page.

The Lake Transition Network is comprised of representatives from school districts, agencies, and parents of students in Camden, Morgan, and Miller counties. The group meets monthly at Camdenton High School to discuss and plan for better ways to meet the needs of transitioning students. People with disabilities are at a greater risk of dropping out of school and have a higher incidence of unemployment and underemployment. The team's goal is to bridge any gaps that may exist in assisting transitioning students to achieve and maintain successful employment, attain postsecondary training and education, and live and navigate independently within the community. It is modeled based on a lower wing tile. Test panels were built up with 57 tiles total, and used for impact testing to determine the amount of damage that would occur for various sizes of foam, impacting at different velocities and impact angles. ## Kyle Gulshen - Candidate in the 2013 U.S. Presidential Scholars Program



Kyle Gulshen, a graduating senior at Camdenton High School, the son of Bart and Ann Gulshen, has been named one of more than 3,000 candidates in the 2013 U.S. Presidential Scholars Program. The candidates were selected from nearly 3.4 million students expected to graduate from U.S. high schools in the year 2013.

Inclusion in the U.S. Presidential Scholars Program, now in its 49th year, is one of the highest honors bestowed upon graduating high school seniors.

Scholars are selected on the basis of superior academic and artistic achievements, leadership qualities, strong character and involvement in community and school activities. Specifically, selection takes into account exceptional performance on either the College Board SAT or the ACT Assessment. In addition, each Chief State School Officer (CSSO) was invited to nominate three male and three female candidates, based on their outstanding scholarship, residing in the CSSO's jurisdiction. Further consideration is based on students' essays, self-assessments, descriptions of activities, school recommendations, and school transcripts.

A distinguished panel of educators will review these submissions and select 500 semifinalists in early April.

The Commission on Presidential Scholars, a group of up to 32 eminent citizens appointed by the President, will make final selection of the Scholars. They will select one young man and one young woman from each state, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, and U.S. students living abroad; 15 students at-large; and up to 20 students from the creative and performing arts. The U.S. Department of Education will announce the Scholars in May.

Scholars will be invited to Washington, DC, for several days in June to receive the Presidential Scholars Medallion at a recognition ceremony and to participate in events and activities with their elected representatives, educators, and other leading individuals in public life.

*A Letter from the Superintendent*



Dear Friends,

A few short weeks ago you received a mailing from our District describing the upcoming election on April 2nd. The Camdenton R-III School District has placed a bond measure on the ballot for our patrons' consideration. The decision to place the issue on the ballot was the result of a long process of gathering input from our patrons, our staff, and our facility planners.

Our students need equitable facilities in our District. We are facing enrollment capacity issues at Osage Beach Elementary and Dogwood Elementary. In order to meet these needs we are asking our patrons to consider a “No Tax Increase” bond issue to build a new Osage Beach Elementary School and refurbish and expand Hurricane Deck Elementary School. This issue would also provide funds to redesign entrances at our elementary, intermediate, and middle school buildings on the main campus to increase security for our students and staff.

Ironically, due to requirements regarding the wording of the ballot, there may be some confusion regarding this issue. The ballot states we are asking voters to increase our debt service tax levy 11 cents from \$.20 to \$.31 per one hundred dollars of assessed valuation. The ballot, unfortunately, could not state we are taking \$.11 from the capital projects levy and moving it to the debt service fund. The total levy will stay the same.

This issue requires a four-sevenths majority vote (57.143%) to be approved. If approved, construction would begin in September and the completion date is planned for July 2015.

## Questions and Answers

**Q:** Why is there a need for new construction?

**A:** Our patrons and parents have expressed the need to have equitable facilities for our students. Students should have similar resources at our elementary schools no matter where the student attends classes in our District. Also, Osage Beach and Dogwood Elementary Schools are near capacity in regard to student enrollment.

**Q:** What projects would be completed with this issue?

**A:**

- A new Osage Beach Elementary School would be constructed at a new site. This building could serve up to 450 students.
- Hurricane Deck Elementary would be remodeled and expanded. New classrooms, gymnasium, kitchen, commons, offices, and playground would be constructed.
- Elementary Schools and the Middle School would have redesigned entrances to increase safety and security.
- \$8,000,000 of outstanding debt would be refinanced.

**Q:** How will the funds be spent?

**A:**

- New PreK-4 Osage Beach Elementary: \$20,250,542
- Addition and Renovation Hurricane Deck Elementary: \$13,734,685
- Security upgrades Dogwood, Hawthorn, Oak Ridge, and Middle School: \$1,014,773
- Refinancing of outstanding lease purchase certificates: \$8,000,000

**Q:** If the proposal is approved, how will it affect the homeowner?

**A:** This issue is being run as a “No Tax Increase” bond issue. **The District is moving \$0.11 of levy from the capital projects fund to the debt service fund. The debt service levy will raise \$0.11, but the capital projects levy will decrease \$0.11.** The total levy will stay the same. Currently our total levy is \$2.87. If the issue is successful the levy will remain at \$2.87.

## Questions and Answers

**Q:** What will the impact be to my taxes if the measure fails?

**A:** The issue is being run as a “No Tax Increase” bond issue. The tax rate is slated to remain at \$2.87 if the issue passes or not.

**Q:** How were our facility plans developed?

**A:** In the fall of 2010 ACI-Frangkiser-Hutchens, an architectural and education planning firm was selected to do a facility study for the school district. This plan was completed in December of 2010. For the past several years this plan was reviewed by patrons, community leaders, and staff members. Based upon input back from these groups the Board of Education voted to place the bond issue on the April ballot.

**Q:** How does the Camdenton R-III tax rate compare to the state average?

**A:** Camdenton R-III has a tax rate of \$2.87 per \$100 of assessed valuation. The state average is \$3.9946.

**Q:** How does our current tax rate compare to other school districts in our area?

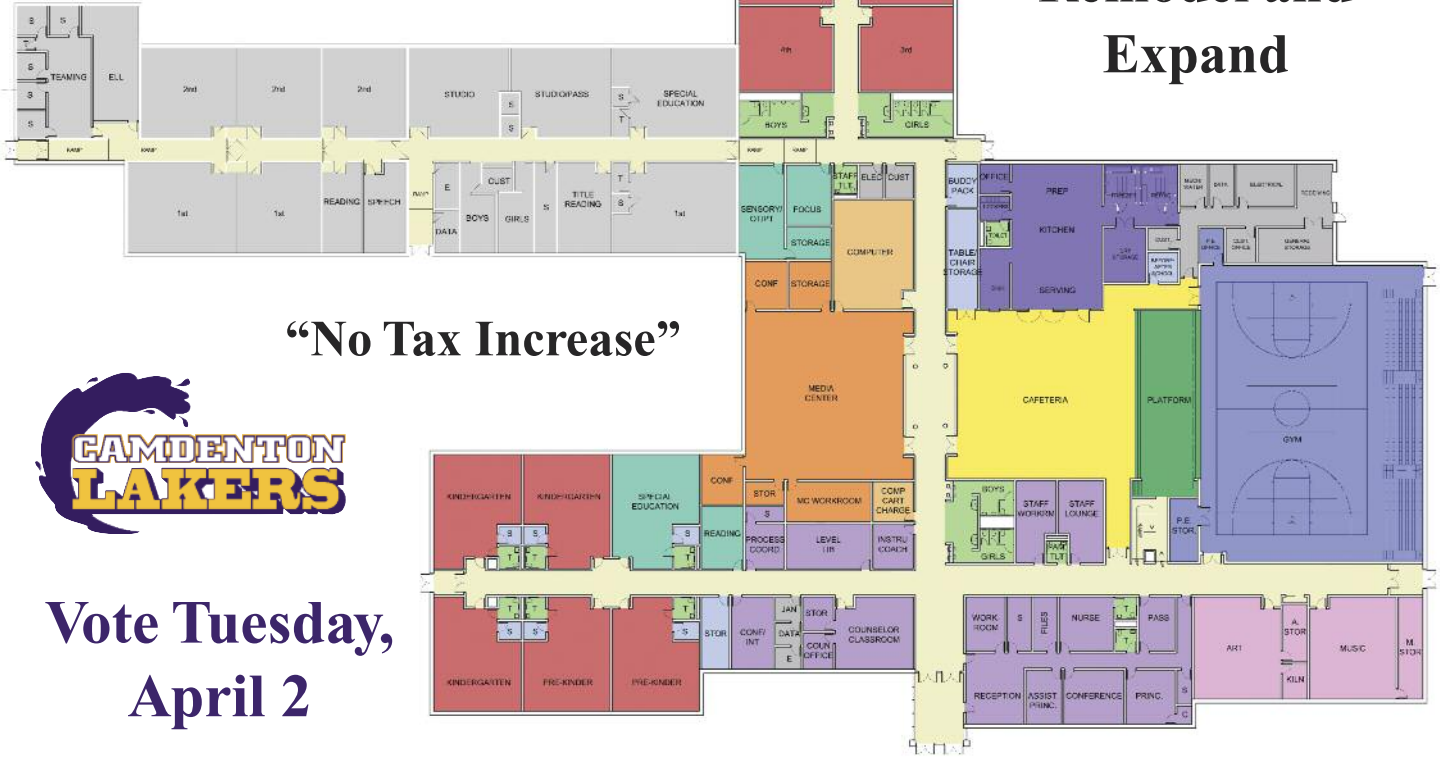

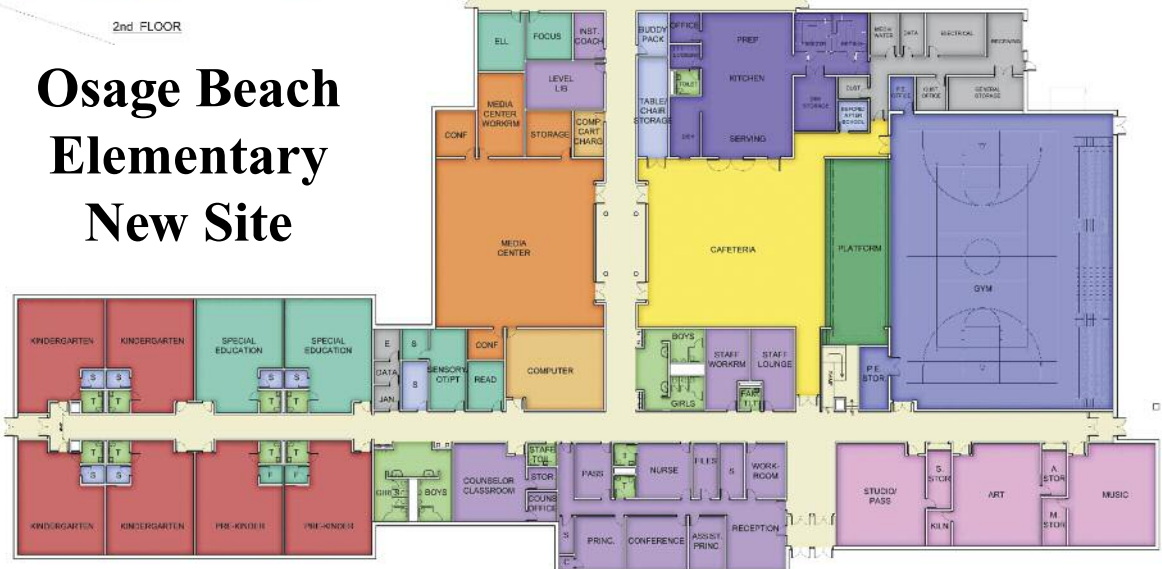

# SWIFT

## (School Wide Integrated Framework for Transformation) National Research Study

Camdenton R-III School District is entering a partnership with SWIFT to develop a national professional learning community in which schools from across the country can learn exemplary practices from each other for school improvement and inclusive education that is guided by teacher teams so that ALL students benefit and learn both socially and academically. We want to blur the lines between all available services so that any child who walks through the doors of Camdenton R-III School District has their individual needs met in as equitable, effective, and typical setting as possible.

The importance of general education and special education working together to create multi-tiered systems of support so ALL students learn is critical to the partnership. Camdenton R-III School District was nominated by Dr. Marilyn Friend, a national expert on co-teaching, who has been working with the school district in providing professional development for general education and interventionist teacher teams who co-teach in classrooms together to meet the needs of ALL students. Camdenton R-III School District utilizes co-teaching in preschool through grade 12 in content areas to meet the needs of ALL students with students who learn differently, such as students who are disabled, students who have limited English proficiency, and students who need additional support through Title I. Dr. Friend has stated that she would put the teachers of Camdenton School District involved in co-teaching up against anyone in the country.

Camdenton R-III School District was selected after 11 schools were visited by SWIFT teams in the country and six are participating in this national conversation. Middle School and Hawthorn Elementary are participating in being observed and having multiple conversations with teams from SWIFT. The district component is also being included through conversations to learn the relationship between the building and district in our growth. Community members and parents will also be a part of the conversations through focus groups.

Todd Shockley, Hawthorn principal, commented, *“What a thrill it is to be selected as a national model by the SWIFT selection team. # A YEAR OF FIRST® FOR CAMDENTON 4-H LASER TEAMS!

This was an exciting year for the Camdenton 4-H FIRST® LASER robotics teams. It literally was a year of many firsts for all divisions of the LASER programs, with over 200 students in fourth through twelve grades participating.



The FIRST® LEGO® League programs at Osage Beach Elementary, Hawthorn Elementary, and Oak Ridge Intermediate had 11 teams travel to Kansas City to compete at the Greater Kansas City Qualifier in November and December. One team from Hawthorn advanced on to the Greater Kansas City Regional, winning “Project Design”.

Oak Ridge qualified to advance to regional competition by winning the coveted “**Gracious Professionalism**” award. At Regional competition, Oak Ridge earned the prestigious “**Judges’ Choice Award**”.



Middle school age students in seventh and eighth grade challenged themselves by moving up a level to participate in FIRST® Tech Challenge (FTC) instead of the FLL division. The majority of teams that compete in the FTC division are high school students. This did not deter the Camdenton Middle School team members as they worked and pushed to have five FTC teams travel to UMKC to compete in the qualifier. In true Laker fashion, the students ended up having all five teams in the top twelve ranking during the event. In the semifinals, two of the LASER teams competed against each other to earn the chance to compete to move on to the State championship. One team was a finalist and qualified



to compete at the State championship at University of Missouri Science and Technology. At the State championship, the LASER FTC team ended the State tournament ranked 11th overall.

The high school FIRST® Robotics Challenge team tackled the toughest engineering challenge in the four-year history of the program. Students had to engineer, design, fabricate, program and market a robot that would shoot Frisbees (both autonomous and driver controlled) and then climb a tower



that was over 100 inches tall. The game “**ultimate ascent**” was played in alliances of three teams where offense, defense, and strategy all come into play.

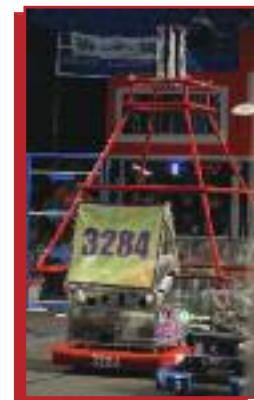
LASER 3284 traveled to St. Louis and competed against 43 teams from the United States. LASER left with a championship banner and was named the alliance captain, which qualified the team for a third trip in just four short years to the World Championship where 37 countries competed for the World title. In addition to winning the overall regional, 3284 was awarded the Underwriter’s Laboratory Safety award for the third year in a row and the team also captured the Entrepreneur award.

Team 3284 traveled to the World Championship armed with a well-designed robot and an experienced drive team. The LASER team battled its way through three days of practice and competition rounds where, in the alliance selection, they were asked to join the number two alliance to compete on the Galileo World finalist field. After a highly contested battle, the LASER team fell in the final match and medaled as a finalist, ending their amazing season as one of the TOP eight alliances in the world!



Camdenton R-III will be only the second school in Missouri to have the full progression of FIRST® programs with the addition of the Jr. FIRST® LEGO® League (JrFLL) that will serve students in kindergarten through second grade. JrFLL is a simple introduction to STEM (science, technology, engineering, and math).

To cap off the amazing season by all FIRST® LASER teams, the Camdenton R-III Afterschool Services offices are proud to announce that they will be the Central Missouri host for an official FIRST® LEGO® League qualifier. The event will bring numerous teams and individuals to the community to stay overnight in November. Many volunteers will be needed to help host and run the tournament. Congratulations to our Laker team physician, Dr. Chris Leslie, who was inducted into the Missouri Sports Hall of Fame in a ceremony in Jefferson City on April 14, 2013.

Dr. Leslie first realized his love of sports and medicine while standing on the sidelines as a ten-year-old watching the Jefferson City Jays with his father, fellow Hall of Famer, Dr. James T. Leslie, who was the team physician for Coach Pete Adkins for over 40 years. Dr. Leslie decided he wanted to follow in his father’s footsteps and become an orthopedic surgeon as it was the ultimate opportunity to combine his love of sports and medicine.

Upon establishing his orthopedic surgery practice specializing in sports medicine and total joint replacement in 1991, he realized he was raising his family in the middle of another sports dynasty, the Camdenton Lakers. For the past 23 years, he has had the privilege of serving as the team physician for the Lakers’ sports programs. Leslie teamed up with fellow Hall of Fame inductee, then-Athletic Director and Football Coach Bob Shore, to provide a program that included immediate access for acute treatment of injuries as well as preventative education about sports-related issues for both the athletes and the community. Volunteering his time on the sidelines and in his office has been a pleasure for Dr. Leslie, who has also awarded scholarships to graduating seniors who exemplify the strong character traits expected in Lakers.

## National Merit Students



The National Merit Scholarship Program is an academic competition for recognition and scholarship that began in 1955. High school students enter the National Merit Program by taking the PSAT as a junior. This test is the initial screening of approximately 1.5 million students each year. As the competition narrows, 34,000 will become commended, 16,000 will be considered semifinalists, and 15,000 become national finalists. This year the class of 2013 has three students who have achieved this distinguished honor: **Katelyn Goodwin, Logan Gilbert, and Jacob Harmon.**

In addition, two students from the class of 2013 were selected as National Merit Scholar Finalists and were among 8,300 students from across the country who received Merit scholarships: **Kyle Gulshen and Rose Anderson.**



## Missouri Scholars 100 Program

Each year the Missouri Association of Secondary School Principals sponsors the Missouri Scholars 100 program. This program recognizes 100 of Missouri's top scholars statewide. Students are selected based on a ten-event academic decathlon including grade point average, ACT/SAT scores, activities, advance classes, leadership and community service. **Kyle Gulshen and Rose Anderson** have received this recognition.

## Missouri Scholars Academy

The Missouri Scholars Academy is a three-week academic program for approximately 330 of Missouri's gifted students who are ready to begin their junior year in high school. Schools nominating students for the academy are required to provide specific information to the Department of Elementary and Secondary Education. Participants are selected on the basis of criteria set by the Department of Education. **Katelyn Goodwin and Jacob Harmon** represented the class of 2013 at the Scholars Academy.

Camdenton High School held a Senior Scholarship Assembly in the RC Worthan Auditorium on Friday afternoon, May 10, 2013, where members of the local community, clubs, civic organizations, businesses, and churches gave seniors scholarship monies totaling **\$247,350**. ## Science Research 2013



Congratulations are in order for the seventh year in a row as two Camdenton High School students, under the Science Research program led by Christopher Reeves, represented Missouri at the Intel International Science & Engineering Fair (ISEF) in Phoenix, Arizona. Alaina Sonksen and Connor Burton were awarded cash prizes totaling \$4,000 for their research projects. More than 1700 students from nearly 80 countries compete in this, the largest pre-college science competition in the world. Only 18% of all countries and states involved in the ISEF receive an award of any type.

**Alaina Sonksen**, with her groundbreaking research, determined the physiological effects of bath salts on living organisms. Her research determined, contrary to her hypothesis, that bath salts reduce activity levels, willingness to eat, and increase mortality rates. These findings were found even though the active ingredient in bath salts mimics cocaine and ketamine, both stimulants, with ketamine also being classified as a hallucinogen. For her work, Alaina earned a \$1,000 cash award.



**Connor Burton** received two awards totaling \$3,000 for his original research that determined that jellyfish respond to specific wavelengths of infrared light. His discovery is new to the scientific world, and is currently being reviewed for publication in a peer-reviewed journal. His project found that jellyfish respond to infrared light that is invisible to the human eye. Connor has also proposed the possibility of deterring jellyfish from sensitive areas such as recreational beaches and industrial water intakes, which are regularly clogged by jellyfish “blooms.”

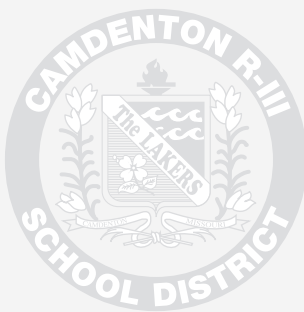

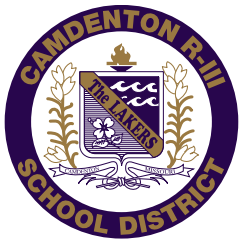

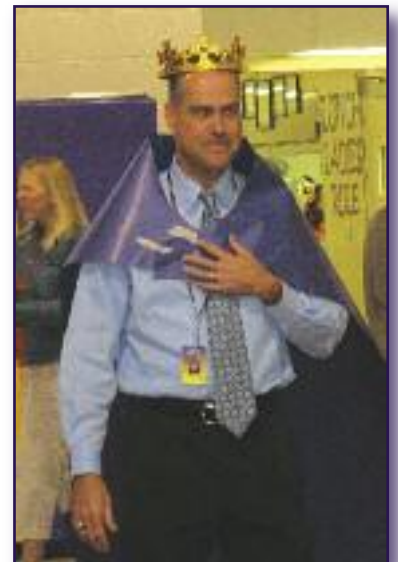

Designed for a capacity of 1,600 students, our modern 260,000 square foot high school facility includes core curriculum areas equipped with science labs, multiple computer labs, the spacious 15,000 book C.C. and Dorothy Blair Media Center, as well as classroom equipment to enhance our goal of academic excellence for all students. # Committed to Excellence in Student Achievement

## Profile

Camdenton High School has changed significantly over the past few years. Student enrollment, changes in personnel, and the addition of a new high school facility have created a need for change that positively benefits the students of our community. Based on this need, the students and faculty of Camdenton High School have created programs to enhance our ability to function as a community of learners focusing on increasing performance and improving opportunities for our students.

Many new structures have been developed to improve our capacity for change, including common learning outcomes and assessments, professional teacher collaboration based on student outcomes and assessment, the development of a privilege system



designed to reward students for behaviors that advance the mission of our community, and the development of academic interventions to address the needs of all students. To support these beliefs, a comprehensive program entitled LEAD Time (Laker Educational Planning, Academic Support, and Decision-making Time) has been implemented.

The curriculum of Camdenton High School is based on power standards and essential learner outcomes in each of our content areas, such as Algebra, American History, and a series of common assessments designed to generate data to address student needs. These outcomes and assessments are based on the Missouri Show-Me Standards and Course Level Expectations. Teachers regularly collaborate to develop action plans based on identified areas of student need and share instructional strategies to support student achievement in each content area.

The Camdenton R-III School Board has approved a professional collaboration schedule whereby teachers have the opportunity to meet and discuss student performance on a regular basis during the contracted day. Providing this type of support for adult learning has been proven to enhance student performance. In addition to supporting student learning

through collaboration and common assessments, the staff at Camdenton High School has developed a system of student privileges to reward behaviors that advance our learning



environment. In our privilege system, students are able to progressively receive more privileges, i.e. preferred parking and early release to lunch) as they progress through each grade level. Each student begins the year with the privileges granted to his/her grade level and keeps these privileges throughout the year if he/she is able to follow academic, attendance, and behavioral expectations of the school. Programs such as ours are proven to reduce the number of office referrals and keep students in classrooms where learning occurs.

As stated in our vision and mission, the faculty of Camdenton High School supports the belief that all students can learn when they are given the appropriate time and support to make learning possible. In addition to support, an effort is being made to strengthen relationships between teachers and students and increase the level of personalization in our building. One aspect of this program, the CHS Academic Intervention Program, was developed to provide students with content-specific help during the school day, as well as additional tutoring and academic support. Though this program might seem geared toward struggling learners, our advanced students also benefit through the opportunity to utilize our media center, commons areas, arranged study groups, and additional enrichment and tutoring activities.

## Academic and Activity Program

Camdenton High School is extremely proud of our tradition of academic success, as well as our emphasis on the well-rounded student taking advantage of co-curricular and extra-curricular opportunities. Camdenton High School offers Dual Enrollment and Advanced Placement classes in numerous academic areas and is an International Baccalaureate (IB) school. We offer a host of opportunities in various areas of student interest. Over ninety percent of the students at Camdenton High School are involved in a school-related activity.

## Goals

### *Developing Skills for a Lifetime!*

- Each year, prior to attending LCTC, students receive career guidance information in order to select a related career and technical program. We assist students in making the transition from LCTC to related employment, continuing education, or entering the military consistent with their expressed interests at a minimum of 88.7% placement rate (as set by the State).
- Each year, students demonstrate responsibility within the technical program by meeting these expectations:
  - maintaining an attendance rate of 95.1% (as set by the State);
  - 80% of the career and technical education students utilizing the “embedded” credit(s) opportunity in mathematics, communication arts, and/or science will obtain an 80% average in order to gain credit;



- 80% of the students will master a minimum of 80% (as set by the State) of the power standards.

## Profile

Career and technical education is an integral part of the total school curriculum. Lake Career & Technical Center programs strive to produce graduates who possess the knowledge and skills that enable all students to become responsible, productive citizens in a changing world.

All career and technical education programs address the following: aspects of pre-employment, technical literacy, technical skills, career planning, and job retention. By incorporating these aspects into all programs, career and technical students acquire the knowledge and skills to successfully enter employment, continue their education or enlist in the military.

Students who attend LCTC are from Camdenton High School, Horizons, Macks Creek High School, Climax Springs High School, and School of the Osage High School, as well as adult students from the area.



Academic performance data is collected and reported through essential skills mastery of specific program power standards. The members who serve on each program's advisory committee validate these standards each fall. All technical programs infuse technical literacy into the training. This includes reading, writing, communication skills, mathematics, and science



appropriate to the coursework. Topics that address the "soft" skills required to retain employment include: team-building, career interest inventories, and goal setting.

Career and technical student organizations are an important part of the curriculum. These organizations are: Future

Farmers of America (FFA), Future Teachers of America (FTA), and SkillsUSA. Each of these clubs promotes leadership, community service, competition, confidence, and socialization skills. The National Technical Honor Society is an honorary organization for seniors who excel in both their regular academic courses and their career and technical courses.



Students who enroll in a block career and technical course may obtain academic credit in mathematics, communication arts,



and/or science. This embedded credit opportunity incorporates competencies from one subject into another subject and allows students to earn credit for both. The competencies

are integrated within the technical course.

LCTC offers programs in the following areas: Agricultural Education, Automotive, Collision Repair, Computer Integration, Construction, Culinary, Graphics Technology, Health Sciences, Marine and Power Sports, Metal Fabrication, and Pre-Teacher Education. New for 2013-14 is Law Enforcement CSI. Equipment, supplies, textbooks, curriculum, safe facilities, and professional development opportunities are equally important to the overall educational aspect of the school culture.

Community Education is another facet of LCTC. Adults may prepare for the GED or simply refresh his/her skills through the Adult Education and Literacy program. Short-term courses are offered in the areas of business and computers, landscape and home gardening, personal enrichment, recreation and health, and trade and industry.

LCTC also hosts training for Volvo Penta. The students enrolled in the Marine Service Technology course, as well as the instructors, have the opportunity to participate in this training.

### **Purpose**

As a department of Camdenton High School, Horizons Laker Educational Center provides alternative learning opportunities to meet distinct needs of high school students in our district.

### **Mission**

The mission of Horizons Laker Educational Center is to inspire and empower a diverse student population to earn a high school diploma in a non-traditional setting.

### **Vision**

The Horizons Laker Educational Center assists students in reaching their full potential as citizens. A respectful environment with a solution-focused approach helps develop students' tools for real life situations. A student-centered approach to holistic education involving community partnerships helps students develop a positive self-concept and post-graduation plan.

### **Educational Program**

Horizons educational program consists of two components:

- ◆ **Academic**
- ◆ **Character/Career/Community Development**

Horizons operates Monday - Thursday, from 8:00 a.m. - 8:00 p.m. and Friday, 8:00 a.m. - 3:00 p.m.

#### **Academic Component**

The academic component provides our students with the academic courses required for graduation. Teachers use a variety of instructional strategies, which meet the various learning needs and styles of our students. Class size is small and individualized to ensure student success.

Many instructional strategies are utilized to create a hands-on learning environment. Teachers and students work together daily to personalize instruction. Through this cooperative process, students gain confidence in themselves. Academically, Horizons curriculum meets the Missouri State Show-Me Standards and MAP criteria, and coordinates with the regular high school curriculum. Students may be full-time at Horizons or transitional between Horizons and CHS and/or LCTC.

#### **Career/Character/Community Development Component**

The career/character/community development component helps students develop social and interactive skills that will assist them in becoming well-rounded, contributing adults in our society. Students are involved in problem solving, lateral thinking, community service, and small group activities. Also, students work on awareness of their career interests and aptitudes. They develop pre-employment skills such as locating jobs, filling out applications, resume writing, and interviewing.

#### **Work and Volunteer Program**

Horizons students receive high school elective credit for paid or volunteer work experience. The Work Coordinator helps students find jobs, if necessary, and monitors the work experience with the employer's input and evaluation of job performance. Horizons students can earn up to two credits a year for successful work experience and one credit a year for community service. Students are also required to spend one hour each week with the Work Coordinator to learn about improving job performance, job attitudes, as well as customer service and co-worker relations. Students can also earn up to one credit for summer employment and/or community service.



A primary focus of the Horizons Work Component is to expand our students' outlook on the world-of-work. The Work Program hopes to expose our students to permanent year-round jobs and careers.

Our students vary in age as well as work experience. We look for job placement in

areas such as construction, food service, clerical, banking, and sales. When a full or part-time need is identified, a student can be identified to meet the need, or several students can be referred for an interview. This is a valuable learning tool for our students and is consistent with our educational goals.

### Missouri Option Program

The Missouri Option Program is targeted for a subgroup of students who have capabilities to complete high school requirements, but for a variety of circumstances are behind in credits needed to

graduate with their class and are at risk of leaving without high school credentials. The students attend school fifteen hours a week until they pass the Missouri Option tests. The students also work or take additional classes to meet criteria for the Missouri Option Program. They can then graduate with their class, receiving a high school diploma.

### Guidance Program

Horizons has a full-time guidance counselor on staff. The counselor provides guidance to students in course selection, scheduling, and post-graduation planning - whether it is further education or the world-of-work. Also, the counselor provides personal and social counseling and conducts the district's testing program for Horizons students.

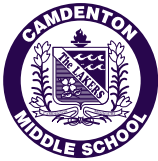

In an effort to build learning relationships and help students connect to school, Camdenton Middle School provides a comprehensive program of study. Programs are provided both during and beyond the school day to enhance learning.

The school day consists of an eight-period day, beginning with a short homeroom period. The purpose of this period is to provide students with a safe, familiar setting to begin each day. Different activities are planned for each day during homeroom:

**Monday**--D.E.A.R. Day -- students “Drop Everything And Read” for enjoyment

**Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday** -- Learning Interventions and Areas of Special Interests (ASI) -- Students are in clubs based on their interests or in learning interventions based on their need for assistance or enrichment. Some of our clubs are: Dance, Intramurals, Strategic Games, Reading, Family Careers and Community Leaders of America, Instrumental Music, and Computers

**Friday** -- KLAKE -- student-generated television newscast focusing on student news and events and Character Education

The remaining seven periods include the core subjects of Communication Arts, Math, Social Studies, and Science along with one period of Health / Physical Education, and two elective periods.

## **Vision**

Oak Ridge Intermediate School has a positive learning climate where teachers, students, and parents work together to achieve a common goal. All students who attend Oak Ridge, no matter what their individual background, join together to form a community of active learners. We emphasize the development of cooperative and caring teams. Using the Show-Me Standards and implementing Grade Level Expectations, our staff collaborates to ensure our students’ needs are being met as we pursue excellence in education.



## **Profile**

Oak Ridge Intermediate School is a community of learners taught by a staff that encourages students to recognize success and strive to be life-long learners. Cooperative Learning is implemented in all of our classrooms. Multiple Intelligence screenings of students enables our staff to continue to work on improving classroom instruction. Teachers are able to attend monthly in-services in these areas.



# Sailing to Success!

Oak Ridge Intermediate is a positive environment for students as they become a community of learners. All staff is encouraged to help students and recognize their successes throughout the year.

Recognizing that technology is important, Oak Ridge's two computer labs give all students instruction in keyboarding, word processing, and research skills. Students are given the opportunity to compete in area and statewide Math and Spelling contests, led by our committed staff. Literacy Coaches provide the support necessary to meet the expectations of our District Language Arts curriculum. We are a school-wide Title I school.



*Teaming enables us to better meet the needs of all students.*

Teaming is implemented throughout our school community to meet the expectations of our curriculum. It enables our staff to have the ability to use combined knowledge of students in a shared planning time, to ask and answer the pertinent questions of:

1. What is it we expect them to learn?
2. How will we know when they have learned it?
3. How will we respond when they do not learn it?
4. How will we respond when they already know it?

## Positive Behavior Support

Positive Behavior Support (PBS) is in the first year of full implementation at Oak Ridge. We have a PBS Team comprised of an administrator, four classroom teachers, one special education teacher, the special education coordinator and both of our counselors. This team is responsible for helping teachers understand the philosophy behind PBS and ensure that it is being implemented with fidelity. There is continual training provided to teachers on clarifying expected behavior, teaching expected behavior, encouraging expected behavior, discouraging inappropriate behavior and effective classroom practices. Oak Ridge staff is working hard to encourage ALL positive behavior in the classroom and throughout the building.



## Recycling

Oak Ridge has partnered with Laclede Industries to recycle paper, plastic, aluminum and glass.

This service is provided at no cost to the school. Through this program, Student Council students are responsible for emptying paper recycling from every teacher's classroom as well as the teacher work rooms in designated recycling bins. Cafeteria staff is working hard to recycle food boxes and aluminum



cans they use. This is an exciting opportunity, and provides teachers the chance to discuss the environmental importance of recycling. At this time, the recycling program is only available to the materials used at Oak Ridge, but allows students to learn recycling practices that will ensure their generation enjoys a happier, healthier Earth.

# Life-Long Learners

The teachers benchmark each student at the beginning of the year to see where they are able to comprehend instruction. Because of our staff's development of common assessments, they are able to determine where each child is in their learning development and make instructional changes. We are now identifying students who need other interventions and are working with subject acceleration, especially in the area of math.

We have implemented co-teaching in our classrooms where an interventionist goes into a classroom and teaches right along with the classroom teacher, allowing them to meet the needs of all students. An intervention time is scheduled in every day where the teachers have time to either re-teach or extend all students' learning.

## **New To Oak Ridge** *Flexible scheduling in the Library Media Center*

The idea behind flexible scheduling is that it allows the teacher and librarian to collaborate on purpose and content of each library visit, lesson, and project. Classes are brought to the library accompanied by their teacher. Small groups or individuals may be sent to the library, rather than the entire class if the teacher and the librarian plan it that way. Flexible access is much more than choosing a time or allowing students to use the media center at their leisure. Flexible access affects every aspect of the library media program. It is a program pulsing with activity, adapting as necessary to make materials, personnel, and facilities readily available to the school community. The emphasis is not on the quantity of time or instruction but on the quality. The library media specialist has time to conference with teachers, work with individual students, teach college and career readiness skills through focus on research, in addition to providing instruction and working with resource-based teaching.

PASS is our before and after school program in which students work to improve reading, math, and study skills.

We also have established support groups for students who have divorced parents, grandparents as parents, or whose parents are deceased.



A special attendance program held at the end of the school year recognizes students by awarding attendance certificates for students missing one day or less of school and certificates and prizes for students with perfect attendance.

Oak Ridge works with Missouri Department of Natural Resources sponsoring an annual pumpkin carving contest. The pumpkins are taken to Ha Ha Tonka State Park for their "Haunted Walk" each October.



Red Carpet assemblies are held at the end of each quarter to celebrate our Fight Free program. Through the Fight Free program, students are taught good decision-making skills in conflict resolution at school and in their community. Working with students to **respect themselves, respect others, and respect their school** enables this to be a highly successful program at Oak Ridge.

Our PTO is very active and supports our building in many ways. Through fundraisers, we have been able to purchase classroom computers, magnetic boards, and TV/DVD/Computer hook-ups.

Oak Ridge has an active Student Council that is involved in several projects throughout the year. Class representatives are elected in every homeroom. They attend Student Council meetings, committee meetings, and project planning meetings. Representatives are to set a good example of citizenship for their classmates and school. Student Council sponsors activities such as Red Ribbon Drug Awareness Week, Christmas Canned Food Drive, Teacher Appreciation Week, and yearbook.



# Community Excitement



The local Kiwanis Club of Camdenton encourages our students to be active community members as well as responsible students through their “Terrific Kids” program. The organization also sponsors the K-Kids program, a student-led service organization for elementary students.



A reading incentive program has been developed and implemented to encourage our students to become life-long readers. Through our District VIPS (Volunteers in Public Schools) Program, each quarter Oak Ridge hosts a reading activity allowing Outstanding Adults to Read with Students (OARS). OARS encourages community member participation to promote reading and a love of books.



Oak Ridge Intermediate students look forward to the annual spring Scooter Soccer Tournament. It takes place in the evening and is the most popular sporting event of the year for the Oak Ridge students.

# A Culture of Learning

## Academic Rigor

Academic rigor at Hawthorn means enhanced learning opportunities for students through differentiated instruction:

- ◆ **Content Acceleration** - Students demonstrating mastery or proficiency of current grade-level expectations have the opportunity to engage in the next appropriate grade-level of instruction.
- ◆ **Small guided-reading groups and math workshops** help meet the specific learning needs of our students by engaging them at their appropriate instructional level.
- ◆ **Flex-grouping\*** allows our teachers to provide focused, “custom-built” instruction. They use pre-assessment data to diagnose and deliver effective instructional strategies, providing appropriate intervention and extension as needed.
  - ◆ **Pre/post assessments** are used by administrators and staff to measure academic growth and demonstrate proficiency of essential learning.



\* **Flex-grouping defined:** Teachers within grade-level teams group students based on pre-assessment performance. Groups are fluid, allowing students to be moved between groups as needed.

Dogwood Elementary is located on the main Camdenton R-III School District campus and serves students from preschool through 2nd grade. Our school embraces the concepts of a Professional Learning Community through the creation of four Small Learning Communities. Our five preschool classrooms comprise one community with the remaining K-2 classrooms divided into three other communities. There are at least three kindergarten, first, and second grade classrooms in each of these three communities. Once a family is placed in a community, their children stay within the same community until the end of their second grade year.



This type of continuity allows teachers to work together to meet the needs of the students. The responsibility for student learning is shared as the students advance through their three years in the community and school.



# Award of Excellence

Professional development for our staff members is a high priority at Dogwood Elementary. Our teachers



utilize collaboration time throughout the year to improve their instruction in the classroom. Teachers have been trained to analyze student data to continuously inform their instruction. This promotes differentiated instruction on a daily basis. Students may receive academic extension or supplemental instruction based on their present level of performance. Additionally, specialized instructional areas range from the nationally acclaimed Reading Recovery program for those students struggling with reading in first grade, Title I services for those students needing supplemental instruction, and a district gifted curriculum for those students who would benefit from enrichment. Subject matter acceleration is also available for students who meet the criteria.



The Camdenton R-III School District and Dogwood Elementary continue to be progressive in the pursuit of the latest technology utilized to increase student achievement. The majority of our classrooms have

interactive Smartboards that are used by teachers and students. Our school now has wireless capabilities throughout the building. We have a web team that meets quarterly during the school year and is continually updating pertinent material to post on our Dogwood website. In our two computer labs we have 50 computers to assist teachers in reinforcing their academic objectives and provide scheduling flexibility when standardized benchmark assessments are administered to students.

Dogwood Elementary has been part of the



Positive Behavior Support (PBS) initiative for the past four years. Consistent behavior routines and procedures are reinforced through

positive recognition of staff and students.

The Dogwood Elementary staff was awarded the Certificate of Excellence in 2012 from the Missouri Department of Elementary and Secondary Education in recognition of the successful implementation of PBS. This reinforced the successful effort of our students to follow our core convictions of **“Be Respectful, Be Responsible, and Be Safe”**.



Dogwood Elementary houses the offices of our district Parents as Teachers (PAT) program. This program provides educational services for children birth through kindergarten

during planned school activities and home visits. The PAT program helps support a very active early childhood education system that includes both morning and afternoon preschools.

Dogwood Elementary is fortunate to be able to provide after-school services through our district PASS (Partners Assisting Student Success) program. The after-school classes are taught by certified teachers and have a lower teacher/student ratio than the normal school day classes. Lessons are linked to the lesson plans of the regular school day; furthermore, activity-based learning takes place through special activities such as student drama acts from “Books to Broadway.” Bus transportation is provided to designated stops following the completion of classes at 5:30 p.m.



# Community Enrichment



We continually strive to involve our parents and other patrons in our school. The district Volunteers in Public Schools (VIPS) office is located in the Dogwood Elementary building. This program was recently highlighted by an accreditation review as one of the most active and valuable volunteer programs in their accreditation region. The district VIPS coordinates the activities of over 200 volunteers in our district. Dogwood Elementary also hosts community informational nights,



family literacy evenings, parent lunches, Veterans Day programs, student musical performances, and Grandparents Day activities. Our Parent Teacher Organization (PTO) meets monthly and provides support for our students and staff in a variety of ways. This includes funding for an annual three-day visit from the Repertory Theater of St. Louis. The community also benefits from our Fine Arts department as students perform musically and have their art projects on public display.



The education we provide our students is comprehensive in both the scope of the academic curricula and opportunity for extra-curricular activities. We are proud to be part of a district that has been recognized by the Missouri Department of Elementary and Secondary Education for Distinction in Performance for 15 consecutive years. Our daily focus reflects the district mission *to create a learning community that maximizes each individual's performance for future success.*

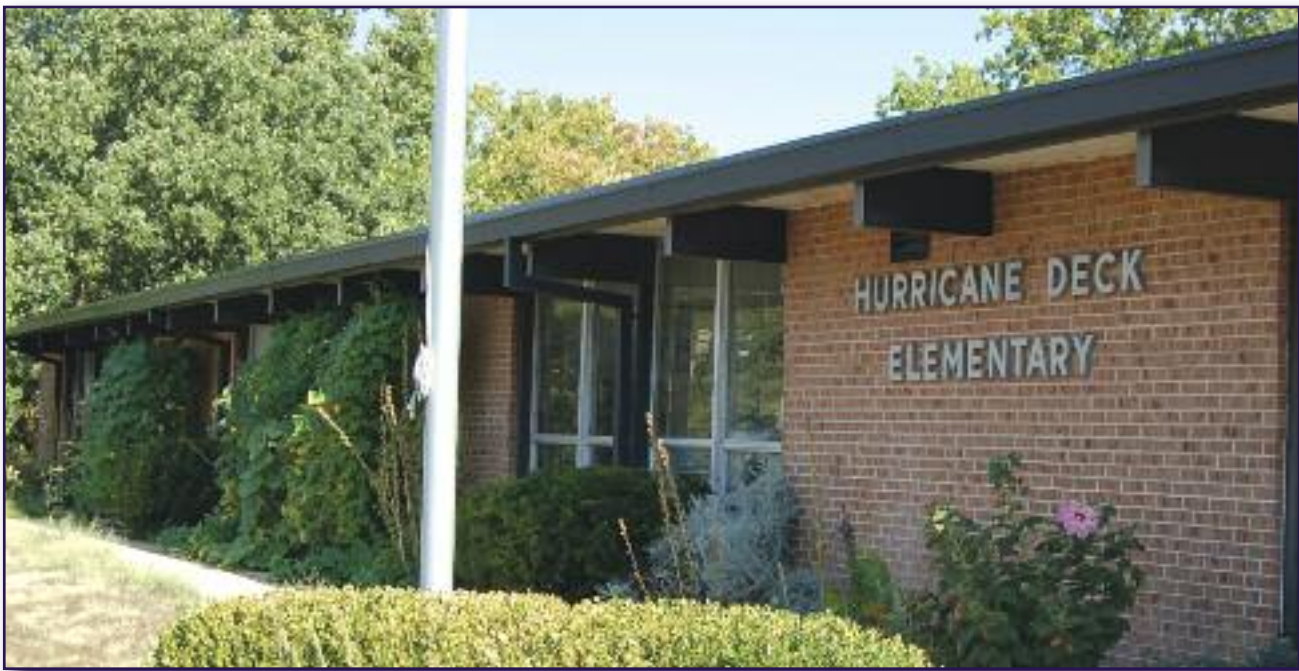

**Profile**

Our school is comprised of approximately 165 students and 30 professional staff members. The school has been a fixture of the community for many years. The original building was constructed in 1952. Hurricane Deck Elementary was expanded in every decade until 2000 to provide for the needs of students who were a part of a growing enrollment.

The Camdenton R-III School District has begun the work of aligning our current curriculum (Grade Level Expectations) to the newly developed Common Core State Standards (CCSS). To date, 45 states and three territories have adopted the Common Core curriculum, with Missouri being one of those states. The CCSS increases the level of rigor at each grade

level and emphasizes informational texts (non-fiction) and argumentative writing.

The Hurricane Deck Elementary administration and faculty encourages the use of various strategies and practices to consistently challenge students to reach their optimum level of academic performance.

This includes grade acceleration for those students who meet the criteria established by the district. Students also participate in Guided Reading or Literature Discussion Groups in upper grades if they are reading at an advanced level. Teachers are continuously receiving professional development in differentiating the instruction in the classroom. The effects of this training can be seen when observing many students participating in enrichment activities under the tutelage of the teacher.



# Enhanced Learning/Community Partnership

The students are actively involved in a strong fine arts and physical educational program. This is true not only during the school day, but before and after school as well. A well-stocked library provides teachers and students with an abundance of rich literature to be used in the classroom and for independent reading. A section of the library is devoted to leveled books that are easily accessed by classroom teachers for guided reading. The Missouri Comprehensive Guidance program is implemented through the school counselor who provides classroom instruction and counseling for individuals or small groups.



We have an active Parents as Teachers program. These professionals work with families who have children from birth to school age.

They also assist in the screening and placement of students in our preschool. The preschool program includes students who are three and four years old. We are a Professional Learning Community that believes all students will learn. Our teachers meet weekly for collaboration time to analyze data, assess student work, and determine interventions. We promote an environment that supports a differentiated instructional approach to meet the needs of all students. Teachers continually refine their skills to enhance higher-order thinking, problem solving, critical thinking, and “hands-on” learning for all students. A recent emphasis on action research has led to the compilation of data on the best practices that allow teachers to modify their instruction accordingly. Professional development for all is a key component in our success.

Teachers at Hurricane Deck School have made a commitment to enhance student learning through the use of technology. One of our fourth grade classrooms and our third grade classroom are e-MINTS (enhancing-Missouri’s Instructional Networked Teaching Strategies) classrooms. We encourage the inquiry-based method of learning by utilizing technological resources available in these classrooms. This includes one computer for every two students, a smart board, scanner, digital camera,

and printer. The teachers have both a workstation for the classroom and a laptop. The teachers in these classrooms commit to a two-year training program which includes the use of technology, how to integrate it into the curriculum, and how to adapt teaching methods to take advantage of the technology.

Every other classroom has a “Smart Board” and at least three computers for student use. A computer lab, staffed by a full-time computer lab educator, is also utilized by the students on a daily basis.

Other examples of our enhanced learning culture includes Title I Reading for those students who need supplemental services. We also have students who participate in our district gifted program. The last two years, teachers have sponsored an after school reading and writing club that has proved to be a popular forum for academic enrichment.

Additional facets of our Professional Learning Community include interventions for those students who may struggle with the standard curriculum.

Our student assistance team meets bi-monthly to discuss strategies to help these students. The team includes our school guidance counselor, intervention specialist teacher, reading recovery teacher, selected classroom teachers, and principal.



## *Involvement is Key!*



We believe family involvement is a critical piece of a child's education. Regular communication between teachers and parents is expected. Family involvement activities, planned by teachers and students, are held throughout the year. Some of these include Math Nights, Parent Breakfasts, MAP nights, and Literacy Nights.



American Legion who support our school program. The local fire department presents a "Risk Watch" program, in which the firemen come into our school and work with our children. Fantastic Fridays are after-school clubs that meet monthly. They include the "Blooming Lakers Garden Club" in which a local garden club

has partnered with the school to learn about nature, landscaping, and general knowledge of the plant world. The

Hurricane Deck Elementary has a strong parent and community involvement program. The Volunteers in Public Schools



(VIPS) program coordinates volunteers who provide additional learning opportunities for the students and assistance for teachers throughout the district. In addition, the PTO is extremely active and continually supports the students and teachers. In recent years, they have helped fund the acquisition of "Smart Boards", playground equipment, a beautiful school sign, and numerous

other projects. The "4-H Club", sponsored by University of Missouri Extension Center, studies everything from cooking to rocketry. Our school counselor leads a service learning club in which our older students actually go out and help with community projects. Hurricane Deck Elementary also has a spacious outdoor classroom that includes a woodland mini-amphitheater and pond.

The PTO hosts activities throughout the year, such as Dinner at the Deck, a Silent Auction, the annual Spring Carnival, and monthly meetings.

We have great partnerships with many

local agencies, businesses, churches, and clubs such as Lions, Elks, Rotary, Kiwanis, and





At Hurricane Deck Elementary, we teach students “The 7 Habits of Effective People,” as developed by the late Dr. Stephen Covey. The school framework for teaching these habits is called *The Leader in Me*. Teachers use a book written by Sean Covey, called The 7 Habits of Happy Kids to introduce the students to the habits.

This is a systematic approach to modeling and developing leadership skills in our students that benefit them far beyond our schoolhouse walls. We hope to create a culture of integrity, communication, respect, and responsibility, which will provide students with life skills that are required to be productive adults. When you visit our school you will notice reminders of the 7 Habits posted throughout the building. Our vision statement at Hurricane Deck Elementary is ***Leaders Learning Every Day!***

Our after-school program, called Project PASS, has a very strong academic focus in

which students receive additional help from certified teachers from 3:10-5:30, Monday through Thursday. We also have a Monday through Friday before-school program called Morning Maneuvers which focuses on problem-solving and critical-thinking skills.



At Hurricane Deck Elementary we believe in the power of students starting their day off in a positive manner so that they are truly ready to learn every day. To help with

this, we have started a program called Breakfast in the Classroom. Within this program, ALL students eat breakfast free of charge every day. Meals are delivered directly to the classroom. Teachers can use this as an opportunity to bond as a community, reinforce good manners, and to get ready for a positive day of learning. Breakfast is from 7:50-8:05. Research has shown that programs such as this are linked to improved school attendance, increased achievement, and declines in disciplinary problems.

## **COMMUNICATION ARTS**

A balanced approach to Reading/Language Arts instruction includes experiences with reading, writing, listening, and speaking. Reading/Language Arts instruction begins early in life. Providing a good language foundation is crucial to creating interest in literature. Teachers support this interest through basic instruction as well as enrichment opportunities. Our main goal is to ensure that all students are proficient in all literacy aspects.

## **MATHEMATICS**

Osage Beach Elementary provides a rigorous, high-quality mathematics curriculum that will enable students to function effectively in the 21st Century. Curriculum is aligned with the Missouri Show-Me Standards, Grade Level Expectations, and recommendations from the National Council of Mathematics Teachers. The goal at Osage Beach Elementary is for our students to become effective problem solvers equipped with critical thinking skills. Students learn mathematics with understanding, actively building new knowledge from experience and prior knowledge.



## **SCIENCE**

Developing the scientific process skills of observing, classifying, comparing, measuring, predicting, communicating, analyzing, interpreting, and inferring are the basics of the science program. Science kits, demonstration videos, Smartboards, and overheads are teaching tools utilized to cover the concepts.

Lessons in social studies emphasize geography, culture, and history. Teachers bring to life the knowledge, skills, and democratic values that students need to participate successfully in a diverse society. At Osage Beach Elementary, we feel that it is our job to prepare our students to be

# Capstone Center Camdenton Laker Gifted Program



The Camdenton R-III School District strives to promote learning for everyone every day. We are thankful to be in a district that seeks to

make that a reality at every level for every learner. Gifted services are an integral part of the district mission and vision; therefore, our collective commitments mirror those of the district. As we strive to meet our commitments, different levels of intervention are provided.

Students identified as gifted in grades first through sixth may participate in the pull-out program at the Capstone Center where affective as well as academic needs are addressed by teachers certified in gifted education. In addition to the pull-out program, students participate in flexible grouping with like-ability peers. The pull-out program as well as flexible grouping offer gifted students time to interact with their intellectual peers. Students in grades 7-8 participate in daily Capstone. Our seventh and eighth grade students participate in units focused on Stream Team, Extemporé and Video Production. Seventh and eighth grade students are placed in appropriate math levels and may also participate in one compacted core class (science, social studies or communication arts) in addition to the Capstone time. Students in grades 9-12 may participate in Advanced Placement (AP) classes as well as the International Baccalaureate (IB) program. Another avenue for meeting student needs is through subject acceleration and whole grade acceleration. The district has



criteria established to determine if a student qualifies for subject or whole grade acceleration.



In the fall, all identified gifted students in grades 5-8 are administered the EXPLORE test to gain insight into their achievement at levels beyond their age peers. The Center also administers Learning Style Inventories to help classroom teachers, parents and Capstone faculty understand each individual child's preferred way of learning.

During Center time, students participate in major units.

The major units incorporate grade level expectations from core subjects such as communication arts, math, science and social studies as well as objectives based on the district adopted gifted curriculum. Close to the end of each semester, students show off their work at "Shine Night", an open house event where they perform and/or exhibit their projects.



The Center assesses learning based on the following performance skills: research, problem solving, critical thinking, communication, affective (also known as socio-emotional needs) and creativity. Students

receive instruction on each performance skill.

Our goal is to facilitate each student's ability to think critically, solve problems, and communicate effectively in a variety of settings and to contribute positively to the community and the world.

# Welcome to Camdenon R-III School District

## Department of Interventions (Pre-K-12)

The Camdenon R-III School District offers many district-wide intervention programs designed to address the unique needs of children, families, and the community. The Department of Interventions is committed to helping all students learn.

### Early Childhood Programs

Our Early Childhood program consists of Preschool, Early Childhood Special Education, and Parents as Teachers. These programs work together to provide parent education and activities to help preschoolers learn.

#### Preschool Program:

Our preschool program serves students who meet eligibility criteria for minor developmental delays. This language-based program focuses on all areas of development: pre-academics, speech and language, fine and gross motor, and social skills.

#### Early Childhood Special Education (ECSE):

The ECSE program serves children who qualify with a disability or developmental delay ages 3-5, who are not yet kindergarten-age eligible. This program provides special education and related services based on the child's unique needs, according to the child's Individualized Education Program (IEP).

#### Parents as Teachers (PAT):

Our PAT program serves families prenatally through kindergarten age, providing parent education, screening services, and developmental information. Group meetings allow parents the chance to meet other parents in the community while participating in educational activities with their child.



### Special Education (K-12):

Special Education and related services are provided in all buildings to children who qualify with an educational disability from kindergarten to age 21. The special education and related services are based on the child's unique needs, according to the child's Individualized Education Program (IEP).



#### Section 504:

Children who have a physical or mental impairment that substantially limits one or more major life activities qualify for a Section 504 Nondiscrimination Plan. This Section 504 Nondiscrimination Plan details the placement, accommodations and/or modifications the child needs in the school environment to address the child's impairment.

#### Homebound Instruction:

Homebound instruction is provided for children who, due to medical or other situational issues, have been determined by a qualified medical professional unable to attend school regularly. A certified educator provides these services in the home, or at a neutral location, allowing the child to continue with his/her academic advancement during medical or other difficulties.

#### Homeless Education:

Children who are considered homeless are provided the same educational opportunities as children who are not homeless. Assistance is provided to the families of these children to facilitate access to medical, financial, and community resources.

**English Language Learners (ELL):**

The ELL program serves children who have limited proficiency in the English language or who have a language minority background. This program provides educational services and accommodations designed to allow children to increase their English skills to the level of proficiency, while experiencing the general curriculum for their current grade level.

**Migrant Education:**

A child whose family must move frequently for the purposes of seasonal employment qualifies for migrant education services. These services are provided to allow the child the opportunity to advance his/her academic achievement, with the ultimate goal of graduation from high school.



**Immigrant Education:**

Services are provided to students who are ages three to 21, were not born in the United States, and who have not been attending one or more schools in any one or more state for more than three full academic years.

**Juvenile Justice Center (JJC):**

The Juvenile Justice Center, located within the Camdenton R-III School District, serves children from area districts who have been placed in temporary care or judicial custody in connection with juvenile proceedings.

The Camdenon R-III School District is committed to creating an environment that extends to the entire school and community by fostering educational experiences to ensure individuals reach their full potential and perform to their highest level. This is accomplished through a set of comprehensive programs including Camdenon R-III's Afterschool Services.



The Camdenon R-III School District promotes a collaborative learning environment and is committed to ensure that "Every student is learning every day". A school-wide system of extended learning takes place daily after school in all district buildings K-12. Certified



teachers develop hands-on lessons that link to district curriculum and local power standards. Through these innovative activities students are provided exciting and challenging curricula and programs.

Afterschool Services offers daily before school programs through open libraries. Students can use the libraries and get homework help from certified staff and High School A+ tutors. Computer labs are also open in the library each morning.



Immediately after school daily, students report to the cafeteria to be greeted by certified teachers and are served a healthy and nutritious snack. A short recreation/physical activity is planned daily, then students proceed to classes. Afterschool classes include a variety of offerings:

**PASS - Partners Assisting Student Success Project** PASS builds strong relationships with the community, the family and the school to provide students and their families with the skills, resources and support necessary for success. Students in PASS receive extra attention and help on homework, and they develop positive relationships with teachers and peers. The goal of the PASS program is to increase reading scores, improve attendance, and increase state standardized test scores





## English Language Learners (ELL)

This program is designed to support non-English speaking students to develop background knowledge so they may be more socially and academically successful in their school and community.



## Enrichment Programs

Sampling of programs include but are not limited to: 4H (University of Missouri Extension), Drivers Education/Car Maintenance, Archery, Writer's Club, Crime Science Investigation, Kids Conservation Club, Lake Bloomers Garden Club, Books to Broadway, Culinary Champions,



Music Club, Chess Club, Art Club and many more. Classes offered and enrollment numbers vary year to year based on funding, facilities and available teachers. Lottery systems are used to fill program seats.

## Laker Pack Child Care

The Laker Pack program provides after-school supervision and engaging developmentally-appropriate activities for children in grades K-6. Currently, the program is located in the Dogwood Elementary building and operates from the time of school dismissal until 5:30, Monday through Friday, when school is in session.

## 4H FIRST LASER Robotics

LASER (Laker Afterschool Science Engineering & Robotics) is an academically rigorous program designed to spark student interest in the areas of STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Math). Students must meet criteria and apply to become a team member. Travel and state-wide competitions are a requirement of this program. The lottery system is used for team selection after eligibility requirements have been met.

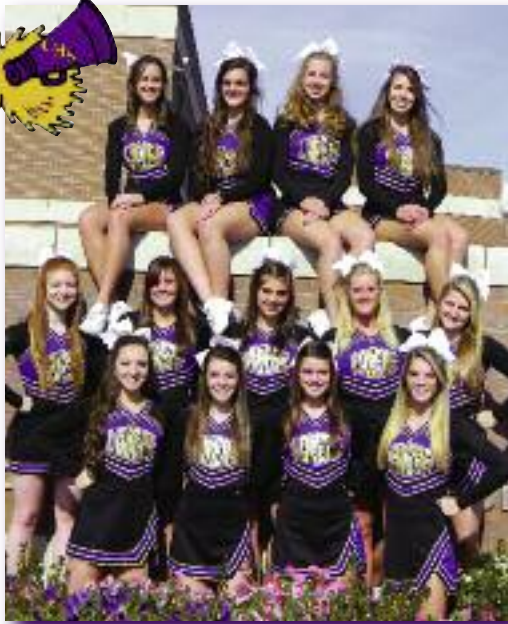

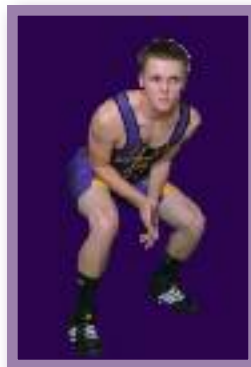

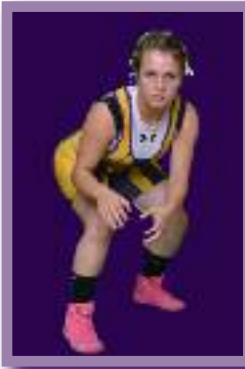

Last year's 2012 Camdenton Lady Lakers Soccer team finished 17-8-1 and scored 99 goals and 82 assists which was a new team record for team assists. After two straight second place finishes in the Ozark Conference track meet, the Lady Laker Track team appears to be poised for a run at the Conference Championship. Last year when the team finished second, it was the highest finish by any Laker sports team, boys or girls, at the Conference level during the 2011-2012 school year. The 2011 Camdenton Softball season was a learning experience for many of the Lady Laker Softball players. In 2011 the team started four freshmen and a sophomore on the varsity and the junior varsity started as many as seven freshmen and had several sophomores filling out the line-up. The season was not only marked by inexperience, but also by injuries as only two players, freshman left-fielder Lyndsay Reeves and freshman shortstop Makinley McCaffrey, started every game. The experience gained last year should serve this year's version of the Lady Laker's Softball team well as they work to improve upon last year's record.

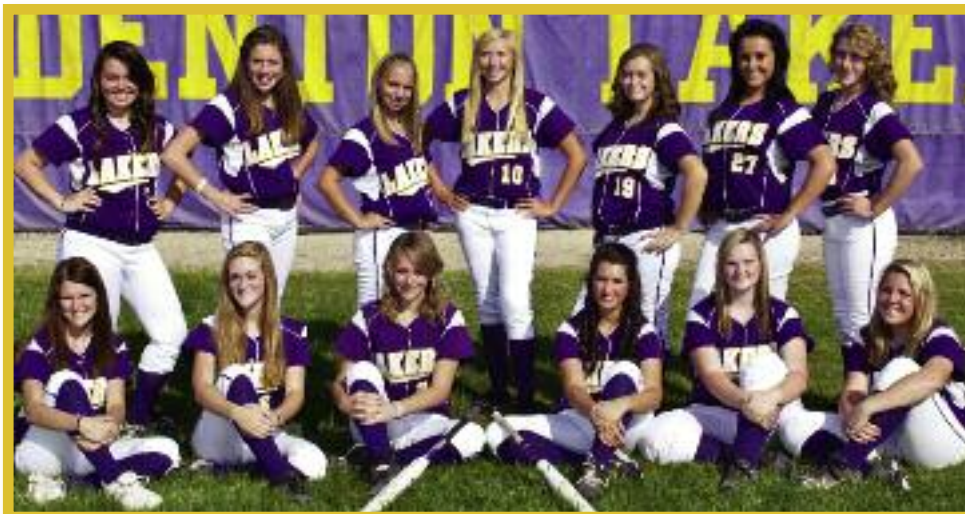

Some of the memories include Jordan and I,

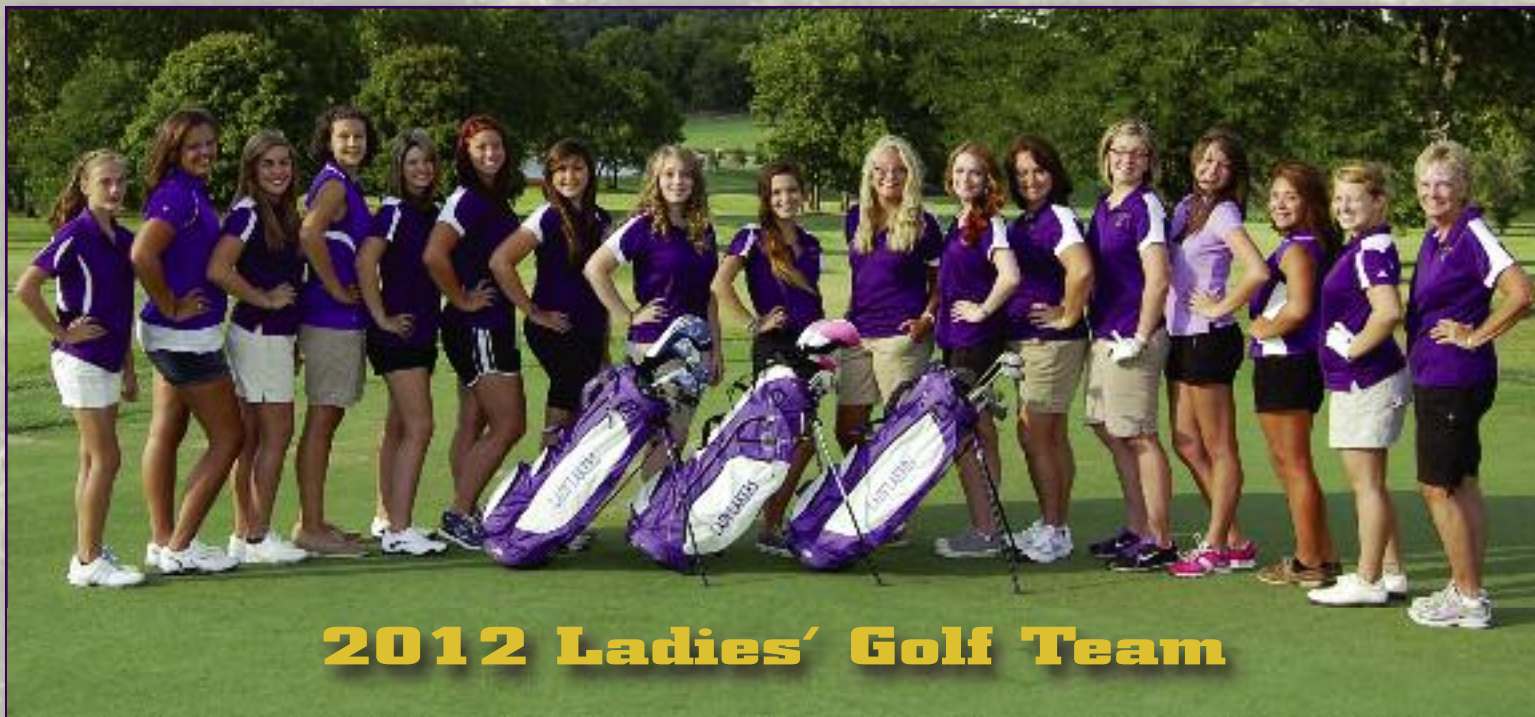

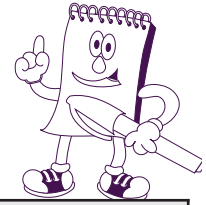

# Student Achievement Data \*



Each spring, all public schools in the State of Missouri are required to administer the state achievement MAP (Missouri Assessment Program) test. The MAP test is given in the areas of Communication Arts to students in grades three through eight; Math to students in grades three through eight; and Science to students in grades five and eight. End-of-Course testing is offered upon completion of Algebra I, English II, and High School Biology.

Student performance on the MAP is reported in terms of four performance or achievement levels: Advanced, Proficient, Basic, and Below Basic. These scores are a means of comparing test results with standards of academic performance as established by a state panel drawn from education, business, and professional communities.

# District Data



The voted tax rate is the maximum amount approved by Camdenton R-III School District voters for school operations (e.g., Incidental, Teacher, Capital Projects Funds). The Debt Service Levy is set by the Board of Education solely for the purpose of retirement of debt. In November, 1998, Missouri voters approved a constitutional amendment which authorizes Boards of Education to set a \$2.75 levy for operations without a vote of school district patrons.

The adjusted tax rate is the actual tax rate levied for a given tax year. For the 2011 tax year, the actual amount levied for Operations was \$2.66. The amount levied for Debt Service was \$.21. The total amount levied was \$2.87.

# 2013 Hall of Leaders Recipient

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## The Honorable Judge James A. Franklin, Jr. Distinguished Alumni



The Honorable Judge James A. Franklin, Jr., was a dedicated and respected member of the Camden community, serving a distinguished law career in Camden County and in the 26th Judicial Circuit Court. Judge Franklin graduated from Camden High School in 1966, and was a Magna Cum Laude graduate of Drury University in Springfield, Missouri, and received his Juris Doctorate in the class of 1975 from the University of Missouri-Kansas City School of Law.

Judge Franklin engaged in private practice in Camden, Missouri, while also serving as the Camden County prosecuting attorney. He was the Associate Circuit Judge from 1978-1981, serving in that capacity again from 1988-1990. Governor Christopher Bond designated Judge Franklin as Supervisor of the Missouri Division of Liquor

Control in 1981 where he effectively served through 1988.

In 1988, Judge Franklin was appointed to the Circuit Court by Missouri Governor John Ashcroft. He was elected to that same position in 1990 and was re-elected in 1994 and 2000. He continued to serve the Court and the people of the 26th Judicial Circuit until he passed away in June, 2006. His leadership resulted in construction of new courthouses in Camden, Miller, Morgan and Laclede counties. Tribute to the respect he garnered and his outstanding leadership, the Justice Center in Camden County is dedicated to Judge Franklin and was officially re-named the James A. Franklin, Jr., Courts Building. In addition, he was instrumental in the development, design, construction and staffing of the Juvenile Justice Center located in Camden.

Along with his unwavering devotion to the people of the 26th Judicial Circuit, Franklin also served on the Board of Directors of Central Bank of Lake of the Ozarks, Board of Directors of the Camden County Library, including the development and construction of the new Camden Library, and was a Charter Member of the Camden United Methodist Church.

Judge Franklin was a loving husband to Julie Robertson Franklin, and the doting father of his two daughters, Stephanie Franklin Shrauger and Andrea Franklin. He is sorely missed by his family, friends, and patrons of this community. We honor Judge Franklin posthumously as a Hall of Leaders Distinguished Alumni.

# 2013 Hall of Leaders Recipient

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## James T. Herfurth

### Friend of the District



James T. Herfurth served the Lake community for over 16 years before his retirement as president and CEO from Central Bank of Lake of the Ozarks in 2004. Herfurth graduated from the University of Missouri in Columbia with a Bachelor of Science in Business Administration. After a brief time with IBM, he served on active duty as a second lieutenant in the Army Artillery School at Fort Sill, OK, from 1960 through 1963. He elected to stay in the Ready Reserve until 1987, retiring at the rank of colonel.

In 1963, Herfurth began his long and successful banking career, starting at the Citizens Bank of Eldon. In 1967, he joined the Central Bank in Jefferson City, where he was the only bank officer to serve as senior vice president of operations then senior vice president of lending. While in Jefferson City, Herfurth was involved in community

leadership positions in the YMCA, United Way, Chamber of Commerce, and Missouri Bankers Association.

In 1987, he moved to the Lake and was elected president and CEO of Central Bank of the Lake of the Ozarks. Herfurth has been active in several initiatives that have benefited the Camdenton R-III School District and its patrons. He was actively involved as chairman of the CARE Committee for the bond issue that built the additions at the outlying schools and also supported the bond issue that brought the new high school to Camdenton. He could always be counted on to support the efforts of the District in both facility expansion and curriculum development.

As a member of the advisory committee to the Missouri Highway and Transportation Commission, Herfurth also chaired the Citizens Committee for Osage Beach Five-Lane in 1991. He was founder and chairman of the Lake of the Ozarks Transportation Council from 1994 to 2007. Through his support and leadership, the bypass in Osage Beach has been completed, and Highway 5 has been improved south to Lebanon and north toward Laurie.

Further, Herfurth has been active in the founding and building of the Tri-County YMCA. He was awarded the "Director's Cup" by the Lake Area Chamber of Commerce as well as the "Spirit of the Lake" award from the Camdenton Chamber of Commerce. Both awards were for his contribution to the economic development of the Lake community.

Culinary Arts students at the Lake Career & Technical Center have prepared a dinner for this evening that we hope will be enjoyed by all. The meal will begin with a chopped salad of romaine, Napa cabbage, cucumber, scallions, and grape tomatoes tossed in an apple cider vinaigrette and served in a Parmesan cheese cup.

For the main course, students have prepared grilled filet mignon and a pork loin roulade stuffed with pancetta, spinach, and mushrooms with a Bordelaise sauce, accompanied by a baked potato fan and a trio of vegetables, julienne carrots, sugar snap peas, and baby corn, lightly tossed in garlic butter.

The Foundation Committee selected the dessert to be served tonight from among 16 entries presented at a tasting by the Culinary Arts students. The winning dessert is a Triple Chocolate Mousse Cake drizzled with Raspberry Coulis, a Chocolate Cup filled with Grand Marnier Mousse, and garnished with an assortment of Fresh Fruits in Season and a Brandy Snap Tuille Cookie. This dessert is a combination of ideas prepared and submitted by Culinary Arts students Logan Blair, Brittany Byler, Jordan Clary, Lilianna Gopar, Melissa McIntire, and Pajje Rynski.

Before the dessert presentation, students will flambé the fruit sauce on the three stages. Students who will be flambéing are:

The Culinary Arts Program offers three classes for students. Freshmen and sophomores who want to explore the culinary arts field may enroll in Culinary Careers, a one-hour semester course. This year, the students have learned some of the basics of safety, sanitation, and measuring techniques, as well as various types of careers in the food industry which they displayed in a Career Fair.

Restaurant Skills is a two-hour, year long course for sophomores and juniors who receive a variety of experiences in both the front and back of the house. Students set up the dining room and serve events, as well as do back-up cooking for events, including cake decorating. Their service uniform consists of black pants, white shirt, black bowtie, and black tuxedo apron.

Culinary Arts is the culminating 3-hour, yearlong course, which focuses on cooking principles and techniques in the back-of-the-house. Students may enroll in this course for two years. This year, there are thirteen first-year students and three returning second-year students who have prepared and served around 40 events for anywhere from 5 to 500 guests. Their uniforms consist of black and white checked pants (which designates a culinary student) and white chef coats. Students with white toques (hats) are first-year students in the class, and those with black toques are second-year students who work on advanced skills and serve as mentors to the first-year students.
