

A letter from the Superintendent

Dear Friends,

The mission of our school district is to create a learning community that maximizes each individual's performance for future success. The Camdenton R-III District believes part of this success is for our students to be happy "when they grow up."

We know the future of our youngest students will be vastly different from the reality we live in today. Thanks to your support, our district will be able to ready our students for the future. Through your approval of our April ballot issue, students at Osage Beach Elementary and Hurricane Deck Elementary will have state-of-the-art facilities to meet the challenges of the future.

Work is beginning on our new elementary building at Osage Beach and our expanded and remodeled building at Hurricane Deck. Soil samples have been taken at both locations and some clearing of the Osage Beach property has been completed. The architects have worked with staff members to draft construction documents. These documents will be used to inform interested general contractors. The timeframe for the presentation of bids for Osage Beach and Hurricane Deck will be this fall with construction beginning in early winter for these buildings. Completion of these projects is slated for the spring of 2015.

Over the summer, the district constructed secure entry access points at Camdenton Middle School and Dogwood Elementary. These entry points have a buzzer and a video system that visitors need to utilize in order to enter the building after the school day begins. School personnel verify the visitor's identity and buzz the individual into the building. As a visitor enters the building, he/she must check in at the office before access is granted into the rest of the building. These features help us provide a quality learning environment for our students. During the summer of 2014, these secure entry

points will also be installed at Hawthorn Elementary and Oak Ridge Intermediate schools.

Late this summer the district received its Annual Performance Report from the Missouri Department of Elementary and Secondary Education. This report gauges our performance on five indicators. These indicators include:

- 1. Academic Achievement
- 2. Subgroup Achievement
- 3. College and Career Readiness
- 4. Attendance Rate
- 5. Graduation Rate

The Camdenton R-III District received 135.5 points out of a possible 140 points for a percentage of 96.8%. This places the Camdenton R-III School District among the top 11% of the districts in the State of Missouri as we compare Annual Performance Report scores.

This high level of achievement is a testament to the dedication of our students, staff, parents, and patrons of our district. While we are very proud of this level of performance, we also must be cognizant of the ever-increasing level of performance we must attain. With this said, we must strive to be the best while at the same time understand we are teaching more than academics. We must also help our students build a foundation for a happy life.

As of September 25, 2013, our district PreK-12 enrollment was 4,359. The enrollment by building as compared to last year is as follows:





The Missouri School Improvement Program (MSIP) 5 is designed to prepare every child for success in school and life. MSIP 5 is the state's school accountability system for reviewing and accrediting public school districts in Missouri. MSIP began in 1990 and is entering its 5th version this year.

The five areas in which the state measures our effectiveness are **Academic Achievement**, **Subgroup Achievement**, **College and Career Readiness**, **Attendance Rate**, and **Graduation Rate**. The Camdenton R-III School District scored a 96.8% out of a possible 100%.


The score of 96.8% places Camdenton in the 10th percentile of all of the schools in the state. Comparing our number to schools that we are familiar with, we perform very well.



Camdenton R-III to host Mid MO *FIRST*® **LEGO**® League Qualifier



Camdenton R-III Schools is pleased to announce that it has been selected by *FIRST*® to be the Mid MO host for an upcoming 24-team qualifier tournament. The tournament is sponsored by the Camdenton 4-H *FIRST*® LASER 3284 World Championship Finalist team.

Twenty-four teams from the state of Missouri will converge on Camdenton High School for opening ceremonies on November 16 at 9:00 AM to compete in the 2013 *FIRST*® LEGO® League (FLL) robotics "Nature's Fury"! The FLL tournament is comprised of teams with students who range from ages 9 to 14. Teams of up to ten participants, with one adult coach, participate in the challenge by programming an autonomous robot to score points on a themed playing field (robot game), developing a solution to a problem they have identified (the project), all guided by the FLL core values.

FLL is an international program created in a partnership between *FIRST*® and LEGO®, based on a common belief that fun and learning go hand-in-hand, and that an inspired mind can accomplish anything. Using LEGO® MINDSTORMS® technologies and LEGO® materials, children work alongside adult mentors to design, build and program robots to complete missions based on real-world challenges. After an intense build season, the competition culminates at high-energy, sports-like tournaments.

During the November 16 event, Camdenton schools will also showcase exciting STEM (science, technology, engineering and math)



activities that are being taught within the district. Spectators can engage in hands-on activities and learn more about the importance of STEM in their communities.

"The Camdenton R-III District is proud and honored to host this tournament. This event is an incredible learning opportunity for our students, parents, and patrons.

Also, by hosting this event on our campus, our community benefits economically by bringing visitors from all over mid-Missouri to the Lake area. This event would not be possible without the efforts of our faculty members in charge of the robotics program and the support from our community", shared Dr. Hadfield.

The event is free and open to the public. Opening ceremonies start at 9:00 AM and awards will wrap up around 3:00 PM. Concessions will be available throughout the day's events. Over 50 community and *FIRST*® volunteers will be assisting with the tournament.

Third in the Nation Skills USA Nationals

This past summer, nearly 6,000 outstanding career and technical education students (who were all state contest winners) competed in 98 different hands-on trade, technical and leadership fields. Students work against the clock and each other, proving their expertise in their chosen occupation. Contests are run with the help of industry, trade associations, and labor organizations, with test competencies being set by the industry.

Justin Sherill, an adult student in Larry Wittrock's Marine Service Technology program, placed 3rd in the nation at the SkillsUSA Nationals. This is the second year in a row that Justin has received the bronze medal award in the Marine Service Technology program at the national level.



A Trip of a Lifetime

It was the trip of a lifetime for educator Chris Reeves' International Baccalaureate (IB) and marine biology students. This group had the opportunity to visit Belize for eight days and immerse themselves in activities ranging from scuba diving a coral atoll island to participating in a humanitarian mission with school children on the island.



During their first two days on the island, the students stayed at a tropical research facility in the heart of the Belize rainforest. They experienced guided hikes, cave tubing, and zip-lining through the canopy

of the rainforest, as well as visiting a Mayan ruin to learn, firsthand, about the Mayan culture through the eyes of a Mayan guide. They were also able to visit the school they have adopted. School children in Belize do not have access to public education, and their families are responsible for the cost of sending their children to school. Those families can pay up to 20% of their annual income to educate their children each year. Our Camdenton High School students were able to donate six large boxes of school supplies to their adopted school.

The final days of this fantastic experience were spent on Glovers Atoll, an island 50 miles offshore. The United Nations has designated this island as a World Heritage site because it



represents one of the best examples in the world of a pristine coral reef. Our students were able to have guided scuba excursions during this time as well as the opportunity to visit an adjacent

island that is owned by the Wildlife Conservation Society. This island is used for research by scientists all over the world to conduct research on native sharks and grouper. For the first time, students were able to conduct their own research on-site and a science research student at CHS will be presenting her findings at various state, national, and (hopefully) international research competitions.

IB and marine biology students are currently planning a return trip to Belize to continue their support of their adopted school and to enhance their research passion.

Welcome to the Camdenton R-III School District

The Camdenton R-III School District is an incredible place. We are extremely proud of our students, our staff, our schools, and our community. Whether you are a parent, a patron considering a move to the Lake area, or a person interested in employment with the district, enclosed you will learn why people want to be a part of this fantastic district.

Camdenton R-III has always placed a heavy emphasis on its instructional program. The district maintains the highest state rating, that being the first school district in Missouri to have all schools in the district accredited by the North Central Association of Colleges and Schools. The Osage Beach Elementary School was named a Missouri Gold Star School in 2004-05, and a federal designated Blue Ribbon School in 2005-06. In April of 2007, the Camdenton High School was one of only twelve high schools in Missouri to be designated to offer the academically rigorous International Baccalaureate Diploma Program. The district has also attained our state's highest accreditation rating under the Missouri School Improvement Program every year possible.

To accomplish our academic goals, the Camdenton R-III School District operates nine attendance centers. Six of the buildings are located on the campus in Camdenton, Missouri. They are as follows: a state-of-the-art High School, Lake Career & Technical Center, Camdenton Middle School, Oak Ridge Intermediate School, Hawthorn Elementary School, and Dogwood Elementary School. The district operates two additional elementary centers. Hurricane Deck Elementary School is located sixteen miles north of Camdenton in Sunrise Beach, Missouri. Osage Beach Elementary School is located sixteen miles east of Camdenton in Osage Beach, Missouri. The district operates the Horizons Alternative School on Highway 54 West in Camdenton. As we look to our future, the district will construct a new elementary school at Osage Beach and expand our school at Hurricane Deck. These buildings will be ready for students and staff for the 2015-2016 school term.

The Camdenton R-III School District has experienced significant growth over the past two decades. Our current student enrollment for preschool through grade twelve now stands at 4,300. Because of the growth in population, the assessed valuation of the district has increased dramatically. The significant increase in assessed valuation has enabled the district to offer a comprehensive educational program with one of the lowest tax rates in the state.

Profile

Camdenton High School has changed significantly over the past few years. Student enrollment, changes in personnel, and the addition of a new high school facility have created a need for change that positively benefits the students of our community. Based on this need, the students and faculty of Camdenton High School have created programs to enhance our ability to function as a community of learners focusing on increasing performance and improving opportunities for our students.

Many new structures have been developed to improve our capacity for change, including common learning outcomes and assessments, professional teacher collaboration based on student outcomes and assessment, the development of



a privilege system designed to reward students for behaviors that advance the mission of our community,

and the development of academic interventions to address the needs of all students. To support these beliefs, a comprehensive program entitled LEAD Time (Laker Educational Planning, Academic Support, and Decision-making Time) has been implemented.

The curriculum of Camdenton High School is based on power standards and essential learner outcomes in each of our content areas, such as Algebra, American History, and a series of common assessments designed to generate data to address student needs. These outcomes and assessments are based on the Missouri Show-Me Standards and Course Level Expectations. Teachers regularly collaborate to develop action plans based on identified areas of student need and share instructional strategies to support student achievement in each content area.

The Camdenton R-III School Board has approved a professional collaboration schedule whereby teachers have the opportunity to meet and discuss student performance on a regular basis during the contracted day. Providing this type of support for adult learning has been proven to enhance student performance. In addition to supporting student learning through collaboration and common assessments, the staff at Camdenton High School has developed a system of student privileges to reward behaviors that advance our learning environment. In our privilege system, students are able to progressively receive

more privileges, (i.e. preferred parking and early release to lunch) as they progress through each grade level. Each student begins the year with the privileges granted to his/her grade level and keeps



these privileges throughout the year if he/she is able to follow academic, attendance, and behavioral expectations of the school. Programs such as ours are proven to reduce the number of office referrals and keep students in classrooms where learning occurs.

As stated in our vision and mission, the faculty of Camdenton High School supports the belief that all students can learn when they are given the appropriate time and support to make learning possible. In addition to support, an effort is being made to strengthen relationships between teachers and students and increase the level of personalization in our building. One aspect of this program, the CHS Academic Intervention Program, was developed to provide students with content-specific help during the school day, as well as additional tutoring

and academic support. Though this program might seem geared toward struggling learners, our advanced students also benefit through the opportunity to utilize our media center, commons areas, arranged study groups, and additional enrichment and tutoring activities.

related employment, continuing education, or entering the military consistent with their expressed interests at a minimum of 88.7% placement rate (as set by the State).



- Each year, students demonstrate responsibility within the technical program by meeting these expectations:
 - maintaining an attendance rate of 95%
 - 80% of the career and technical education students utilizing the "embedded" credit(s) opportunity in mathematics, communication arts, and/or science will obtain an 80% average in order to gain credit;



■ 80% of the students will master a minimum of 80% (as set by the State) of the power standards. The Camdenton R-III School District and Lake Career & Technical Center are committed to creating an environment that maximizes each individual's performance for future success.

Profile

Career and technical education is an integral part of the total school curriculum. Lake Career & Technical Center programs strive to produce graduates who possess the knowledge and skills that enable all students to become responsible, productive citizens in a changing world.

All career and technical education programs address the following: aspects of pre-employment, technical literacy, technical skills, career planning, and job retention. By incorporating these aspects into all programs, career and technical students acquire the knowledge and skills to successfully enter employment, continue their education or enlist in the military.

Students who attend LCTC are from Camdenton High School, Horizons, Macks Creek High School, Climax Springs High School, and School of the Osage High School, as well as adult students from the area.



Academic performance data is collected and reported through essential skills mastery of specific program power standards. The members who serve on each program's advisory committee validate these standards each fall. All technical programs infuse technical literacy into the training. This includes reading, writing, communication skills, mathematics, and science



appropriate to the coursework. Topics that address the "soft" skills required to retain employment include: team-building, career interest inventories, and goal setting.

Career and technical student organizations are an important part of the curriculum. These organizations are: Future

Farmers of America (FFA), Future Teachers of America (FTA), and SkillsUSA. Each of these clubs promotes leadership, community service, competition, confidence, and socialization skills. The National Technical Honor Society is an honorary organization for seniors who excel in both their regular academic courses and their career and technical courses.



Students who enroll in a block career and technical course may obtain academic credit in mathematics, communication arts.



and/or science. This embedded credit opportunity incorporates competencies from one subject into another subject and allows students to earn credit for both.

The competencies

are integrated within the technical course.

LCTC offers programs in the following areas:
Agricultural Education, Automotive, Collision Repair,
Computer Integration, Construction, Culinary, Graphics
Technology, Health Sciences, Marine and Power Sports,
Metal Fabrication, and Pre-Teacher Education. New for
2014-15 is Law Enforcement CSI. Equipment, supplies,
textbooks, curriculum, safe facilities, and professional
development opportunities are equally important to the
overall educational aspect of the school culture.

Community Education is another facet of LCTC. Adults may prepare for the GED or simply refresh his/her skills through the Adult Education and Literacy program. Short-term courses are offered in the areas of business and computers, landscape and home gardening, personal enrichment, recreation and health, and trade and industry.

LCTC also hosts training for Volvo Penta. The students enrolled in the Marine Service Technology course, as well as the instructors, have the opportunity to participate in this training.

Purpose

As a department of Camdenton High School, Horizons Laker Educational Center provides alternative learning opportunities to meet distinct needs of high school students in our district.

Mission

The mission of Horizons Laker Educational Center is to inspire and empower a diverse student population to earn a high school diploma in a non-traditional setting.

Vision

The Horizons Laker Educational Center assists students in reaching their full potential as citizens. A respectful environment with a solution-focused approach helps develop students' tools for real life situations. A student-centered approach to holistic education involving community partnerships helps students develop a positive self-concept and post-graduation plan.

Educational Program

Horizons educational program consists of two components:

- **♦** Academic
- **♦** Character/Career/Community Development

Horizons operates Monday - Thursday, 8:00 a.m. - 8:00 p.m. and Friday, 8:00 a.m. - 3:00 p.m.

Academic Component

The academic component provides our students with the academic courses required for graduation. Teachers use a variety of instructional strategies, which meet the various learning needs and styles of our students. Class size is small and individualized to ensure student success. Many instructional strategies are utilized to create a

hands-on learning environment. Teachers and students work together daily to personalize instruction. Through this cooperative process, students gain confidence in themselves. Academically, Horizons curriculum meets the Missouri Grade/Course Level Expectations and EOC criteria, and coordinates with the regular high school curriculum. Students may be full-time at Horizons or transitional between Horizons and CHS and/or LCTC.

Career/Character/Community Development Component

The career/character/community development component helps students develop social and interactive skills that will assist them in becoming well-rounded, contributing adults in our society. Students are involved in problem solving, lateral thinking, community service, and small group activities. Also, students work on awareness of their career interests and aptitudes. They develop pre-employment skills such as locating jobs, filling out applications, resume writing, and interviewing.

Work and Volunteer Program

Horizons students receive high school elective credit for paid or volunteer work experience. The Work Coordinator helps students find jobs, if necessary, and monitors the work experience with the employer's input and evaluation of job performance. Horizons students

can earn up to two credits a year for successful work experience and one credit a year for community service. Students can also earn up to one credit for



summer employment and/or community service.



A primary focus of the Horizons Work Component is to expand our students' outlook on the worldof-work. The Work Program hopes to expose our students to permanent year-round jobs and careers. Our students vary in age as well as work experience. We look for job placement in

areas such as construction, food service, clerical, banking, and sales. When a full or part-time need is identified, a student can be identified to meet the need, or several students can be referred for an interview. This is a valuable learning tool for our students and is consistent with our educational goals.

Missouri Option Program

The Missouri Option Program is targeted for a subgroup of students who have capabilities to complete high school requirements, but for a variety of circumstances are behind in credits needed to graduate with their class and are at risk of leaving without high school credentials. Students are required to study for a minimum of fifteen hours a week for the Missouri Option test until successfully completing the test. In addition, students are required to work and/or take classes fifteen hours a week while studying for the Missouri Option test and thirty hours a week after they have successfully completed the Missouri Option test. There are other specific requirements that the

student must also meet. If the students meet all requirements, they will receive a high school diploma.



Guidance Program

Horizons has a full-time guidance counselor on staff. The counselor provides guidance to students in course selection, scheduling, and post-graduation planning - whether it is further education or the world-of-work. Also, the counselor provides personal and social counseling and conducts the district's testing program for Horizons students.

Enriched Learning for All

In an effort to build learning relationships and help students connect to school, Camdenton Middle School provides a comprehensive program of study. Programs are provided both during and beyond the school day to enhance learning.

The school day consists of an eight-period day, beginning with a short homeroom period. The purpose of this period

is to provide students with a safe, familiar setting to begin each day. Different activities are planned for each day during homeroom:

Monday - Friday: Work centers are available for any student who has not completed his/her work in the classroom. Students are assigned to the work centers daily to complete their assignments.

Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday: Learning Interventions and Areas of Special Interests (ASI) - Students are in classes based on their interests or in learning interventions based on their need for assistance or enrichment. Some of the classes are: Dance, Intramurals, Reading, Art Posters, Strategic Games, and Computers.

The remaining seven periods include the core subjects of Communication Arts, Math, Social Studies, and Science along with one period of Health/Physical Education, and two elective periods.

- 4. How will we respond when they already know it?


Positive Behavior Support


Positive Behavior Support (PBS) is in the first year of full implementation at Oak Ridge. We have a PBS Team comprised of an administrator, four classroom teachers, one special education teacher, the special education coordinator and both of our counselors. This team is responsible for helping teachers understand the philosophy behind PBS and ensure that it is being implemented with fidelity. There is continual training provided to teachers on clarifying

expected behavior, teaching expected behavior, encouraging expected behavior, discouraging inappropriate behavior and effective classroom practices. Oak Ridge staff is working hard to encourage ALL positive behavior in the classroom and throughout the building.

Recycling

Oak Ridge has partnered with Laclede Industries to recycle paper, plastic, aluminum and glass.







cans they use. This is an exciting opportunity, and provides teachers the chance to discuss the environmental importance of recycling. At this time, the recycling program is only available to the materials used at Oak Ridge, but allows students to learn recycling practices that will ensure their generation enjoys a happier, healthier Earth.



Life-Long Learners

The teachers benchmark each student at the beginning of the year to see where they are able to comprehend instruction. Because of our staff's development of common assessments, they are able to determine where each child is in their learning development and make instructional changes. We are now identifying students who need other interventions and are working with subject acceleration, especially in the area of math.

We have implemented co-teaching in our classrooms where an interventionist goes into a classroom and teaches right along with the classroom teacher, allowing them to meet the needs of all students. An intervention time is scheduled in every day where the teachers have time to either re-teach or extend all students' learning.

Flexible scheduling in the Library Media Center

The idea behind flexible scheduling is that it allows the teacher and librarian to collaborate on purpose and content of each library visit, lesson, and project. Classes are brought to the library accompanied by their teacher. Small groups or individuals may be sent to the library, rather than the entire class if the teacher and the librarian plan it that way. Flexible access is much more than choosing a time or allowing students to use the media center at their leisure. Flexible access affects every aspect of the library media program. It is a program pulsing with activity, adapting as necessary to make materials, personnel, and facilities readily available to the school community. The emphasis is not on the quantity of time or instruction but on the quality. The library media specialist has time to conference with teachers, work with individual students, teach college and career readiness skills through focus on research, in addition to providing instruction and working with resource-based teaching.

PASS is our before- and after-school program in which students work to improve reading, math, and study skills.

We also have established support groups for students who have divorced parents, grandparents as parents, or whose parents are deceased.



A special attendance program held at the end of the school year recognizes students by awarding attendance certificates for students missing one day or less of school and certificates and prizes for students with perfect attendance.

Oak Ridge works with Missouri Department of Natural Resources sponsoring an annual pumpkin carving contest. The pumpkins are taken to



Ha Ha Tonka State Park for their "Haunted Walk" each October.

Red Carpet assemblies are held at the end of each quarter to celebrate our Fight Free program. Through the Fight Free program, students are taught good decision-making skills in conflict resolution at school and in their community. Working with students to **respect themselves, respect others, and respect their school** enables this to be a highly successful program at Oak Ridge.

Our PTO is very active and supports our building in many ways. Through fundraisers, we have been able to purchase classroom computers, magnetic boards, and TV/DVD/Computer hook-ups.

Oak Ridge has an active Student Council that is involved in several projects throughout the year. Class representatives are elected in every homeroom. They attend Student Council meetings, committee meetings, and project planning meetings. Representatives are to set a good example of citizenship for their classmates and school. Student



Council sponsors activities such as Red Ribbon Drug Awareness Week, Christmas Canned Food Drive, Teacher Appreciation Week, and yearbook.

Community Excitement



The local Kiwanis Club of Camdenton encourages our students to be active community members as well as responsible students through their "**Terrific Kids**" program. The organization also sponsors the K-Kids program, a student-led service organization for elementary students.

A reading incentive program has been developed and implemented to encourage our students to become life-long readers. Through our District VIPS (Volunteers in Public Schools) Program, each quarter Oak Ridge hosts a reading activity allowing Outstanding Adults to Read

with Students (OARS). **OARS** encourages community member participation to promote reading and a love of books.




Dogwood Elementary is located on the main Camdenton R-III School District campus and serves students from preschool through 2nd grade. Our school embraces the concepts of a Professional Learning Community through the creation of four Small Learning Communities. Our five preschool classrooms comprise one community with the remaining K-2 classrooms divided into three other communities. There are at least three kindergarten, first, and second grade classrooms in each of these three communities. Once a family is placed in a community, their children stay within the same community until the end of their second grade year.







This type of continuity allows teachers to work together to meet the needs of the students. The responsibility for student learning is shared as the students advance through their three years in the community and school.





Award of Excellence

Professional development for our staff members is a high priority at Dogwood Elementary. Our teachers



utilize collaboration time throughout the year to improve their instruction in the classroom. Teachers have been trained to analyze student data to continuously inform their instruction. This promotes differentiated instruction on a daily basis. Students may receive academic extension or supplemental instruction based on their present level of performance. Additionally, specialized instructional areas range from the nationally acclaimed Reading Recovery program for those students struggling with reading in first grade, Title I services for those students needing supplemental instruction, and a district gifted curriculum for those students who would benefit from enrichment. Subject matter acceleration is also available for students who meet the criteria. The Camdenton




R-III School District and Dogwood Elementary continue to be progressive in the pursuit of the latest technology utilized to increase student achievement. The majority of our classrooms have


interactive Smartboards that are used by teachers and students. Our school now has wireless capabilities throughout the building. We have a web team that meets quarterly during the school year and is continually updating pertinent material to post on our Dogwood website. We have two computer labs including a mobile lab with netbooks to assist teachers in reinforcing their academic objectives and provide scheduling flexibility when standardized benchmark assessments are administered to students.

Dogwood Elementary has been part of the Positive



Behavior Support (PBS) initiative. Consistent behavior routines and procedures are reinforced through positive recognition







Dogwood Elementary houses the offices of our district Parents as Teachers (PAT) program. This program provides educational services for children birth through kindergarten during planned school

activities and home visits. The PAT program helps support a very active early childhood education system that includes both morning and afternoon preschools.

Dogwood Elementary is fortunate to be able to provide after-school services through our district PASS (Partners Assisting Student Success) program. The after-school classes are taught by certified teachers and have a lower teacher/student ratio than the normal school day classes. Lessons are linked to the lesson plans of the regular school day; furthermore, activity-based learning takes place through special activities such as student drama acts from "Books to Broadway." Bus transportation is provided to designated stops following the completion of classes at 5:30 p.m.






Community Enrichment

We continually strive to involve our parents and other patrons in our school. The district Volunteers in Public Schools (VIPS) office is located in the Dogwood Elementary building. This program was recently highlighted by an accreditation review as one of the most active and valuable volunteer programs in our accreditation region. The district VIPS coordinates the activities of over 250 volunteers in our district. Dogwood Elementary also hosts community

informational nights, family literacy evenings, parent lunches, Veterans Day programs, student musical performances, and Grandparents Day activities. Our

Parent Teacher Organization (PTO) meets monthly and provides support for our students and staff in a variety of ways. This includes funding for an annual three-day visit from the Repertory Theater of St. Louis.

The community also benefits from our Fine Arts department as students perform musically and have their art projects on public display.



The education we provide our students is comprehensive in both the scope of the academic curricula and opportunity for extra-curricular activities. Profile

Our school is comprised of approximately 165 students and 30 professional staff members. The school has been a fixture of the community for many years. The original building was constructed in 1952. Hurricane Deck Elementary was expanded in every decade until 2000 to provide for the needs of students who were a part of a growing enrollment.

The Camdenton R-III School District has begun the work of aligning our current curriculum (Grade Level Expectations) to the newly developed Common Core State Standards (CCSS). To date, 45 states and three territories have adopted the Common Core curriculum, with Missouri being one of those states. The CCSS increases the level of rigor at each grade

level and emphasizes informational texts (non-fiction) and argumentative writing.

The Hurricane Deck Elementary administration and faculty encourages the use of various strategies and practices to consistently challenge students to reach their optimum level of academic performance. This includes grade acceleration for those students who meet the criteria established by



the district. Students also participate in Guided Reading or Literature Discussion Groups in upper grades if they are reading at an advanced level. Teachers are continuously receiving professional development in differentiating the instruction in the classroom. The effects of this training can be seen when observing many students participating in enrichment activities under the tutelage of the teacher.

Enhanced Learning/Community Partnership

The students are actively involved in a strong fine arts and physical educational program. This is true not only during the school day, but before and after school as well. A well-stocked library provides teachers and students with an abundance of rich literature to be used in the classroom and for independent reading. A section of the library is devoted to leveled books that are easily accessed by classroom teachers for guided reading. The Missouri Comprehensive Guidance program is implemented through the school counselor who provides classroom instruction and counseling for individuals or small groups.



We have an active Parents as Teachers program.
These professionals work with families who have children from birth to school age. They also assist in the screening and placement of students in our preschool. The preschool program

includes students who are three and four years old. We are a Professional Learning Community that believes all students will learn. Our teachers meet weekly for collaboration time to analyze data, assess student work, and determine interventions. We promote an environment that supports a differentiated instructional approach to meet the needs of all students. Teachers continually refine their skills to enhance higher-order thinking, problem solving, critical thinking, and "hands-on" learning for all students. A recent emphasis on action research has led to the compilation of data on the best practices that allow teachers to modify their instruction accordingly. Professional development for all is a key component in our success.

Teachers at Hurricane Deck School have made a commitment to enhance student learning through the use of technology. One of our fourth grade classrooms and our third grade classroom are e-MINTS (enhancing-Missouri's Instructional Networked Teaching Strategies) classrooms. We encourage the inquiry-based method of learning by utilizing technological resources available in these classrooms. This includes one computer for every two students in the e-MINTS classroom, a smart

board, scanner, digital camera, and printer. The teachers have both a workstation for the classroom and a laptop. The teachers in these classrooms commit to a two-year training program which includes the use of technology, how to integrate it into the curriculum, and how to adapt teaching methods to take advantage of the technology.


All other classrooms have a "Smart Board" and at least three computers for student use. A computer lab, staffed by a full-time computer lab educator, is also utilized by the students on a daily basis.

Other examples of our enhanced learning culture includes Title I Reading for those students who need supplemental services. We also have students who participate in our district gifted program. The last two years, teachers have sponsored an after-school reading and writing club that has proved to be a popular forum for academic enrichment.

Additional facets of our Professional Learning Community include interventions for those students who may struggle with the standard curriculum. Our student assistance team meets bi-monthly



to discuss strategies to help these students. The team includes our school guidance counselor, intervention specialist teacher, reading recovery teacher, selected classroom teachers, and principal.



We believe family involvement is a critical piece of a child's education. Regular communication between teachers and parents is expected. Family involvement activities, planned by teachers and students, are held throughout the year. Some of these include Math Nights, Parent Breakfasts, MAP nights, and Literacy Nights.

Hurricane Deck Elementary has a strong parent and community involvement program. The Volunteers in Public Schools (VIPS) program coordinates volunteers who provide additional learning opportunities for the students and assistance for teachers throughout the district. In addition, the PTO is extremely active and continually supports the students and teachers. 
We have great partnerships with many local agencies, businesses, churches, and clubs such as Lions,

At Hurricane Deck Elementary, we teach students "The 7 Habits of Effective People," as developed by the late Dr. Stephen Covey. The school framework for teaching these habits is

called *The Leader in Me*. Teachers use a book written by Sean Covey, called <u>The 7 Habits of Happy Kids</u> to introduce the students to the habits. This is a systematic approach to modeling and developing leadership skills in our students that benefit them far beyond our schoolhouse walls. We hope to create a culture of integrity, communication, respect, and responsibility,

which will provide students with life skills that are required to be productive adults. When you visit our school you will notice reminders of the "7 Habits" posted throughout the building. Our vision statement at Hurricane Deck Elementary is *Leaders Learning Every Day!*

Our after-school program, called Project PASS, has a very strong academic focus in which students receive additional help from certified teachers from 3:10-5:30, Monday through

Thursday. We also have a Monday through Friday before-school program called Morning Maneuvers



which focuses on problem-solving and criticalthinking skills.

At Hurricane Deck Elementary we believe in the power of students starting their day off in a positive manner so that they are truly ready to learn every day. To help with this, we have started a program called Breakfast in the

Classroom. Within this program, ALL students eat breakfast free of charge every day. Meals are delivered directly to the classroom. Teachers can use this as an opportunity to bond as a community, reinforce good

manners, and to get ready for a positive day of learning. Breakfast is from 7:50-8:05. Research has shown that programs such as this are linked to improved school attendance, increased achievement, and declines in disciplinary problems.

COMMUNICATION ARTS

A balanced approach to Reading/Language Arts instruction includes experiences with reading, writing, listening, and speaking. Reading/Language Arts instruction begins early in life. Providing a good language foundation is crucial to creating interest in literature. Teachers support this interest through basic instruction as well as enrichment opportunities. MATHEMATICS




SOCIAL STUDIES

Capstone Center Camdenton Laker Gifted Program



The Camdenton R-III School District strives to promote learning for everyone every day. We are thankful to be in a district that seeks to

make that a reality at every level for every learner. Gifted services are an integral part of the district mission and vision; therefore, our collective commitments mirror those of the district. As we strive to meet our commitments, different levels of intervention are provided.

Students identified as gifted in grades first through sixth may participate in the pull-out program at the Capstone Center where affective as well as academic needs are addressed by teachers



certified in gifted education. In addition to the pullout program, students participate in flexible grouping with like-ability peers. The pull-out program as well as flexible grouping offer gifted students time to interact with their intellectual peers. Students in grades 7-8 participate in daily Capstone. Our seventh and eighth grade students participate in cross-curricular units such as Debate and Extemporé. They are also given opportunities to research and write and/or present on educational topics of interest to them. Seventh and eighth grade students are placed in appropriate math levels and may also participate in one compacted core class (science, social studies or communication arts) in addition to the Capstone time. Students in grades 9-12 may participate in Advanced Placement (AP) classes as well as the International Baccalaureate (IB) program. Another avenue for



meeting student needs is through subject acceleration and whole grade acceleration. The district



has criteria established to determine if a student qualifies for subject or whole grade acceleration.

In the fall, all identified gifted students in grades 5-8 are administered the EXPLORE test to gain insight into their achievement at levels beyond their age peers. The Center also



administers Learning Style Inventories to help classroom teachers, parents and Capstone faculty understand each individual child's preferred way of learning.

During Center time, students participate in major units. The major units incorporate grade level expectations from core subjects such as communication arts, math, science and social studies as well as objectives based on the district adopted gifted curriculum. Close to the end of each semester, students show off their work at "Shine Night", an open house event where they perform and/or exhibit their projects.

The Center assesses learning based on the following performance skills: research, problem solving, critical thinking, communication, affective (also known as socio-emotional needs) and creativity. Students receive instruction on each performance skill.

Our goal is to facilitate each student's ability to think critically, solve problems, and communicate effectively in a variety of settings and to contribute positively to the community and the world.

Welcome to Camdenton R-III School District Department of Interventions (Pre-K-12)

The Camdenton R-III School District offers many district-wide intervention programs designed to address the unique needs of children, families, and the community. The Department of Interventions is committed to helping all students learn.

Early Childhood Programs

Our Early Childhood program consists of Preschool, Early Childhood Special Education, and Parents as Teachers. These programs work together to provide parent education and activities to help preschoolers learn.

Preschool Program:

Our preschool program serves students who meet eligibility criteria for minor developmental delays. This language-based program focuses on all areas of development: pre-academics, speech and language, fine and gross motor, and social skills.

Early Childhood Special Education (ECSE):



The ECSE program serves children who qualify with a disability or developmental delay ages 3-5, who are not yet kindergarten-age eligible. This program provides special education and

related services

based on the

child's unique needs, according to the child's Individualized Education Program (IEP).

Parents as Teachers (PAT):

Our PAT program serves families prenatally through kindergarten age, providing parent education, screening services, and developmental information. Group meetings allow parents the chance to meet other parents in the community while participating in educational activities with their child.



Special Education (K-12):

Special Education and related services are provided in all buildings to children who qualify with an educational disability from kindergarten to age 21. The special education and related services are based on the child's unique needs, according to the child's Individualized Education Program (IEP).

Section 504:

Children who have a physical or mental impairment that substantially limits one or more major life activity/activities qualify for a Section 504 Nondiscrimination Plan. This Section 504 Nondiscrimination Plan details the placement, accommodations and/or modifications the child needs in the school environment to address the child's impairment.



Homebound Instruction:

Homebound instruction is provided for children who, due to medical or other situational issues, have been determined by a qualified medical professional unable to attend school regularly. A certified educator provides these services in the home, or at a neutral location, allowing the child to continue with his/her academic advancement during medical or other difficulties.

English Language Learners (ELL):

The ELL program serves children who have limited proficiency in the English language or who have a language minority background. This program provides educational services and accommodations designed to allow children to increase their English skills to the level of proficiency, while experiencing the general curriculum for their current grade level.





Migrant Education:

A child whose family must move frequently for the purposes of seasonal employment qualifies for migrant education services. These services are provided to allow the child the opportunity to advance his/her academic achievement, with the ultimate goal of graduation from high school.

Immigrant Education:

Services are provided to students who are ages three to 21, were not born in the United States, and who have not been attending one or more schools in any one or more state(s) for more than three full academic years.

The Camdenton R-III School District promotes a collaborative learning environment and is committed to ensure that "Every one is learning every day". A school-wide system of extended


enrollment numbers vary year to year based on funding, facilities and available teachers. Lottery systems are used to fill program seats.







Welcome to the 2013 Football season, Laker fans. Head Coach Jeff Shore starts his third year at the helm of the Lakers football team. The Lakers went 8-4 in the 2012 season with a second straight District championship, and a third straight trip to the state quarterfinals.

Last year the team started off 2-3 before hitting their stride late in the season and going on a six-game winning streak into the quarterfinals. The Lakers kept the tradition going with the Purple Haze defense, and solid hard-nose football on both sides of the ball. The 2013 Lakers are looking forward to building off the success of last season, and going for a conference title and another deep playoff run. Let's take a look at this year's players - starting with the HOGS!!!

Seniors on the offensive line are Ace Martin, Alex Palomo, Logan Sousley, Zach Burns and Ben Parrish. The Lakers have only one returning starter on the line, junior Henry Brownell. Seniors Brendan Babbs and Jordan Webster will also see passes thrown their way this season. The wide receivers are a very talented and experienced group for the Lakers this season. At tight end you will see seniors Eric Frandsen and Tyler Scheig. They will have to do double duty as they pave a way for the running game and help out in the passing game. Also look for juniors Ty McDuffey and Joey Ginnings to get plenty of on-field time.

Throwing to that talented receiving core will be senior Tyler Cunningham. Tyler is a talented individual, receiving a Division I baseball scholarship; he will lead the offense for the Lakers this season. Transfer Bo Dean, a senior who was an All-State QB at his previous school, will be competing for the job with Tyler this season. Both are very good football players as well as leaders and will help navigate the Lakers in an exciting 2013 season.

Defensive coordinator coach Nick Bruck is in his second year calling the defense. Coach Bruck brings great knowledge of game intensity and gets the players ready to play PURPLE HAZE DEFENSE!

The defensive line this year is returning two starters, senior Colby Rizer at nose guard and junior Alexx Wilsman. Rizer is undersized yet plays like a giant in the trenches, disrupting the opposing offense and creating havoc on the side of the ball. Wilsman, a 6'4", 240 lb. defensive tackle, will be on the edge screaming after opponents, whether it is a run or pass situation. Look for seniors Brigham Arnold, Ace Martin, and Tyler Scheig to see time as well. Juniors Johnny Hollandsworth and Justin Murdock, sophomores Isaiah Hills and Josh Keys will rotate in and compete for a spot in the trenches on Friday nights. Both sophomores bring good size and athletic ability to the defensive line.

Seniors Matt Endsley and Tyler Cunningham are both returning starters for the Lakers at the outside linebacker spot. They are very good playmakers and created turnovers and key stops last year and are looking forward to a great senior campaign. Brendan Babbs will see playing time in both of their positions as he is a very versatile player for the Lakers.

The inside linebacker position will be filled by newcomer Josh Martin, an All-Conference player at his previous school. As a sophomore he will be a cornerstone in the Laker defense this year. Seniors Shayne Cook and Eric Frandsen will also see time as inside linebackers. They are very good players and sure tacklers on defense.

The secondary returns three out of the four starters from last year: senior Kullen Carlock, who is a ball-hawking safety with four interceptions last year, senior Elijah Ollison, who is a hard-hitting safety and will knock out opposing players, and senior Ryan Elliott, a great cover man on the edge who has the ability to be a lock-down defender. On the other corner there are three candidates: senior Jordan Webster and juniors Jacob Wise and Derek Beck, all of whom are very talented and will see time on the field.

The Lakers will again host a Jamboree on August 23 and then have the season opener at home against Hillcrest - the defending Conference champs. The second week will also be at home, versus West Plains. The Lakers first road game will be down Highway 5 against the Lebanon Yellowjackets. The last time these two faced off, the Lakers were victorious and brought the "Highway 5 trophy" home to Camdenton. The Lakers will have another home game the following week versus Kickapoo. Parkview will be in Springfield this year as the Lakers go on the road. Homecoming will be against the Rolla Bulldogs at Bob Shore Stadium. The Lakers then go on a two-game road trip, first with the orange and black Tigers from Waynesville and then to Joplin. Senior night and the final home game before Districts start will be against the Glendale Falcons.

Pride of the Lake










Coach Calbert states, "I am really looking forward to being able to







Each spring, all public schools in the State of Missouri are required to administer the state achievement MAP (Missouri Assessment Program) test. The MAP test is given in the areas of English Language Arts to students in grades three through eight; Math to students in grades three through eight; and Science to students in grades five and eight. End-of-Course testing is offered upon completion of Algebra I, English II, and High School Biology.

Student performance on the MAP is reported in terms of four performance or achievement levels: Advanced, Proficient, Basic, and Below Basic. These scores are a means of comparing test results with standards of academic performance as established by a state panel drawn from education, business, and professional communities.

The Debt Service Levy is set by the Board of Education solely for the purpose of retirement of debt. In November, 1998, Missouri voters approved a constitutional amendment which authorizes Boards of Education to set a \$2.75 levy for operations without a vote of school district patrons.

The adjusted tax rate is the actual tax rate levied for a given tax year. For the 2012 tax year, the actual amount levied for Operations was \$2.67. The amount levied for Debt Service was \$.20. The total amount levied was \$2.87.
